CONGRESS LIMITS REGULAR ARMY TO 175,000 MEN

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18.—Congress voted today to limit the size of the regular army of the United States to 175,000 enlisted men.

The Senate by a vote of 41 to 33 set aside the decision of last week to reduce the army to 150,000 men and without a record vote adopted the original joint resolution of Senator New, Republican, Indiana, directing the Secretary of War to stop recruiting until the army is 175,000 men.

The House ten minutes later adopted a joint resolution sponsored by Chairman Kahn of its military committee until there are not more than 175,000 enlisted men in the regular establishment. The House vote was 285 to 4.

Congress acted in opposition to the wishes of General Pershing, who had informed the Senate committee on military affairs that an army of 200,000 men constituted the "safety margin."

George McBride, known as Washington's "grand old man of the diamond," has been made manager of the Washington baseball club. He will succeed President Clark Griffith who will confine himself in the future to the executive end of the club's business. McBride will leave his home in Milwaukee for Washington about February 15, to take charge of the training camp plans.

Ice Hockey Guide Published

Spalding's Official Ice Hockey Guide and Winter Sports Almanac for Canada, Champlain Provencer, of Montreal, editor, has just been published for the season of 1921 by the Canadian Sports Publishing Co., West, Montreal. It is profusely illustrated with photographs of players and teams that have been prominent in ice hockey, the winter game in which Canada is supreme.

In addition there are abundant illustrations of alluring winter sport and those who engage in them.

The growth of hockey in the Dominion, its benefits to players, its wonderful world series in which Canada stands supreme, its National Hockey League season, the Allan Cup finals and the successful season of the Ontario Hockey League are reviewed crisply and entertainingly and the records and principal scores are given. The fine achievement of the Canadian players in the Olympic hockey in Antwerp is described by one who was there and, to top all of the other good things, there is a review of the last ice hockey season in each of the provinces. That is a feature which makes the new volume of interest to every hockey player from St. Lawrence Gulf to Vancouver.

Attention is especially called to the fact that the new volume contains the rules of hockey which govern the sport in all of its branches.

There is a chapter devoted to skating which summarizes the records in an effort to get authentic compilation of those who have established the "top performances" on the ice in the past. The skating championships are reviewed and in connection with them there is a brief history of early speed skating. Results of figure skating championships are included and the rules for figure skating and speed skating are published for the benefit of those who wish to engage in competition as well as those who wish to conduct competitive events.

Skating the winter sport which is growing faster than any recently undertaken pastime in years, is taking up at length, with a compilation of data that gives the exhilarating pastime a foundation for the future. Together with the skating there is a chapter on snowshoeing.
