**COMPLAINS OF ILL TREATMENT**

AURICH, Germany, Dec. 20 — (CP Cable) — Maj.-Gen. Kurt Meyer, S.S. Commandant charged with responsibility for the murder of 48 Canadian prisoners of war during the invasion of Europe in 1944, told the Canadian Military Court today here that he had received an injury "after my imprisonment, with a rifle butt." He did not elaborate his statement under questioning by his defence counsel, Lt.-Col. M.W. Andrew of Stratford, Ont. The German officer said he had been wounded twice on battlefields for a total of three service wounds.

LONDON, Dec. 20 — (Reuters) — Details of a mutiny aboard the Royal Navy destroyer Javelin last Oct. 17, when a number of ratings
