FIGHT OVER GIRL ENDS IN MURDER

BURLINGTON, Vt., March 22.—After lingering between life and death for four days, Cyrus Moffat, 60, a farmer, died this afternoon in the mountain village of Beartown, or Black Hole Hollow, where he was stricken down in a wild fight at a kitchen dance.

The country is far back from civilization, is over 11 miles from a village of any size, and medical assistance was slow to reach the injured man. The man accused of the murder is Fred Depluis, 30, employed as a lumberman at one of the camps. He has disappeared and is roaming the mountain somewhere.

A search will be instituted at once, but it will be a difficult matter to locate him with the many hiding places which he knows and where he might be secreted. His three brothers, who are charged with implication, are now under arrest.

The fight took place Saturday night, and it is reported was caused by rivalry between a son of Moffat and a nephew over a young woman violinist, who furnished music for the dance. Moffat took a turn at the violin at the request of his son, in order that the woman might become young Moffat's partner for a waltz.

When Depluis saw the younger Moffat dancing with the violinist, it is said, he became greatly angered, and striding up to the couple floored young Moffat with a blow to the head. The older Moffat immediately went to the aid of his son, and it is alleged that Depluis hit him with his fists.

Moffat was stricken down insensible. The authorities did not learn of the matter until word came from the mountain that a man was dying and a States Attorney Meeker, with two physicians, Dr. C. W. Bartlett and F. J. Hurley, took the trip from Bennington, a distance of over 14 miles.

The physicians found one side of the man to be paralyzed and that he was suffering from a leakage of the brain. They administered aid, but the man became gradually worse, and died without making any statement. It is doubtful if the hearing will be held at Beartown but will probably take place in Bennington as the former would be too difficult of access.

ORIGIN OF FIRE AT TRURO UNKNOWN

TRURO, March 24.—The I. C. R. freight shed which, as reported on Thursday, was destroyed by fire was well filled with freight, and this was all destroyed. The entire span of the bridge crossing the I. C. R. tracks and leading to Sydney Park, was burned, and this burned away the telegraph wires and all telegraphic communication with the town is suspended.

The loss is estimated at between \$50,000 and \$75,000, mostly English goods billed to town retailers. The fire spread so rapidly in the oil-soaked wood-work of the floors that it was impossible to stop it, but the firemen soon had half a dozen streams playing on the blaze and were able to confine it to the one building.

KAISER TO VISIT ENGLAND

LONDON, March 23.—Aside from politics it is the coming visit of the Kaiser and Kaiserine which interests all London just now, a visit which will practically mark the beginning of the great coronation festival.

The imperial couple will arrive here on May 15, just after the ending of the long season of mourning, and their arrival will be the signal for an interrupted flow of entertainments such as London has seldom seen.

Although the Victoria Memorial itself, the unending of which might be reason of the Kaiser's visit, is finished and the workmen are now gliding the "Victory" group which surmount it, a good deal of work still remains to be done at the base.

STEEL CO. BUYS WRECK OF QUEBEC BRIDGE

SYDNEY, March 22.—The wreck of the Quebec Bridge will be brought to Sydney and will be manufactured into various forms by the Dominion Iron and Steel Corporation.

The Steel Company has purchased from the Koenig wrecking from which bought contorted mass from the Government, the entire right to the ownership and removal of the bridge that was John R. McIsaac, general traffic manager is now at Quebec arranging for the shipment of the steel which will be brought here by steamers as soon as navigation opens.

LANCOT PAID PROMPTLY FOR PAINTING

OTTAWA, March 23.—The evidence for the prosecution in connection with the charges made by Mr. Blondin, M. P., against Adelard Lancelot, member for Richelieu as to the painting of the latter's residence at Soré, last summer by painters from the marine department's yards there, was concluded this afternoon, and the privileges and elections committee adjourned until Tuesday next, when evidence for the defence will be submitted.

Today's evidence, with that of yesterday, clearly established that there was no effort at concealment in the matter on the part of Mr. Lancelot, who promptly paid the bill, who rendered at his request by the superintendent of the yard, recouping the government for all outlay for either labor or materials.

The fact was conclusively brought out that both Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Hon. Mr. Brodeur, when the matter was brought to their notice, took steps to have a full investigation made and expressly declared against any attempt at keeping the facts from the public. Sir Wilfrid Laurier wrote to an informant in Soré:

"If there have been any misdeeds at Soré it is not the intention of the government to prevent it being known to the public, quite the contrary."

It was further shown that there was considerable animus against the shipyard officials on the part of the men who swore to and who secured the affidavits on which Mr. Blondin based his charges.

SENDS IN FIRE ALARM BECAUSE BABY IS ILL

CHICAGO, March 22.—When baby became suddenly ill send in a fire alarm. This was effectively tried by Mrs. Mary Rothschild when her baby had a severe coughing spell. She rushed into the street, shouting fire, fire, and neighbors sent in fire alarms.

Two companies responded. When a battalion chief asked where the blaze was the reply of the mother was, "Never mind the fire! Baby's choking. Don't stand there doing nothing; help me!"

The firemen called a physician, the baby was soon himself again, and Mrs. Rothschild apologized, saying: "I was so scared I didn't know what to do. The only thing I could think of to yell was 'Fire!'"

WANTS STATE TO PAY \$100 FOR EACH BABY

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., March 22.—Prevention of race suicide, the encouragement of increase in population and the taxation of bachelors are the features of two bills feathered in the Senate by Senator Bather, otherwise known as the "Stork Mayor of Alton."

The first, or anti-race-suicide bill, provides for the payment of \$100 to the mother of each child born within two years after her marriage, and for each additional child born every two years. The premium on twins is fixed at \$200 and on triplets \$300. The other bill places a tax of \$10 a year on bachelors over 35 years of age, the amount to be set aside for the payment of premiums to mothers.

POSTAL BANKS PROVE A SUCCESS

WASHINGTON, March 24.—"The postal savings bank system has been more successful than practically could have been expected." This was the comment made by Postmaster-General Hitchcock on the analysis of the returns from the 48 postal savings banks which have been in operation since January 3 last.

The reports from the 48 second class post offices where the postal banks are located, cover the period from the establishment of the banks to Feb. 28, 1911. In that time, 3,923 accounts were opened and 6,861 separate deposits were made, the average amount of each deposit being \$21.50. In the same period only 259 accounts, the total number of open accounts on Feb. 28 being 8664. The net amount of deposits at the 48 banks after two months of operation was \$133,865. If the same ratio of deposits and withdrawals is maintained for a year the amount on deposits at the end of the year will be \$803,214.

The aggregate population of all the 48 cities in which postal savings banks thus far have been established is approximately 370,000. Statistical experts in the Post Office Department have estimated that if the postal savings system should be patronized in the same proportion when it is established, the total amount on deposit after one year's operation would be about \$200,000,000.

Postmaster General Hitchcock is now engaged in preparing for the establishment of 250 additional postal savings banks, an appropriation of \$500,000 having been made by the recent Congress for the extension of the system. The list of cities in which the banks are to be located probably will be announced in the near future.

COURT ASKED TO FIX VALUE OF COW'S TAIL

MILLERTON, Penn., March 22.—Everybody knows that a cow's tail is valuable. Yet many a cow has gone through life without this appendage. The value of a cow's tail is now to be judicially fixed and it is an incident of intense interest to northern Pennsylvania and southern New York dairymen.

Just over the State line, at Van Etten, lives Lewis Purdy, farmer and owner of a Holstein cow. He alleges that on or about Feb. 22, 1911, one James McKay, yeoman, was driving by the Purdy farm, accompanied by his two dogs; that the dogs ran into Purdy's farm and did bite, cut and detailed said cow to the great distress of the animal and the injury of her owner, to wit, the sum of \$75.

McKay contends, first that his dogs did not do the amputation; and, secondly, if they did, there is no damage to the cow's value for dairy purposes. Final decision is expected on April 3.

TO PUBLISH RED BOOK AGAINST SLOW PAYERS

ATLANTIC CITY, March 22.—How 2500 residents of Atlantic City, many of them rated high socially, pay their bills will be told in a Red Book, to be issued by the City Credit Bureau about April 15.

A supplement in course of preparation will throw light upon the relations existing between Atlantic City business houses and residents of Philadelphia, New York and other cities, who take cottages here for the spring and summer months.

The red volume is expected to save local merchants thousands of dollars in bad debts.
