Leading Editorials, Notes and Comments for Saturday Subscribers

TUESDAY

The River Rhine, one of the famous rivers of the world, rises in the mountains of Switzerland, flows westward through Lake Constance to Basel in Alsace, then bends at right angles northward through the western part of Germany on its way to the North Sea. The Rhine Valley is famous alike for its beauty and historic associations. It now derives new fame from being the route of the first aerial passenger line. Count Zeppelin, now over seventy years of age, owner, master, engineer and helmsman of the airship Deutschland, has established this great enterprise.

The Deutschland is elegantly and luxuriously fitted up, with mahogany seats upholstered for comfort, from which passengers look out through glass upon the fair scenes below. No observation cars on railways, or decks of steamers afford such a view. The airship travels at fair railway speed—30 to 44 miles an hour. Such a trip was never before offered to passengers—from Lake Constance in the extreme south on the border of Switzerland, to Dusseldorf in the far north-west of Germany, 300 miles in nine hours. The fare is high—\$50 first class and \$25 second class, but is surely well worth the money, which is 8 to 16 cents per mile. There is no danger of falling, as the big dirigible airship will float aloft even if the machinery becomes disabled, and can descend gently to the earth when required.

It is stated that there are now in this Province 34 mail routes on which rural delivery has been established, and along which some 500 boxes have been set up at farmers' road-gates. The boxes and the service give excellent satisfaction, and are proving a great boon to the sections of the country served by them. Rural delivery has grown steadily in favor since the beginning was made in the fall of 1908. Residents along a rural delivery route pay \$3 for the first cost of a box and fittings, and are required to provide a suitable post and attach the box thereto. Thereafter the mail driver deposits the incoming letters and papers and takes the outgoing mail matter as he passes. The position of the box indicates whether it contains mail matter or not. No wonder the farmers want the rural delivery and value it when they have it.

THURSDAY

The Canadian Dominion has completed forty-three years of national life. In that time its population has doubled, its trade increased five-fold, its railway mileage eightfold, its area tenfold. It was never so prosperous, or its people more contented and happy than in recent years.

During the forty-three years the Dominion has had nine successive Governor Generals who proved themselves eminently satisfactory to the Canadian people, worthy representatives of the Sovereign and nobility of the Empire, and whose influence has uniformly tended to draw closer the bonds of imperial union. These were Lords Monck, Lisgar, Dufferin, Lorne, Lansdowne, Stanley of Preston, Aberdeen, Minto and Grey.

Six different Premiers have held political power successively in the Dominion since it was formed. These have been Sir John Macdonald, Hon. Alexander Mackenzie, Sir John Macbott, Sir John Thompson, Sir Mackenzie Bowell and Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the last-named still in office after fourteen years of continuous power.

During the forty-three years no other First Minister held power continuously so long as Sir Wilfrid. Sir John Macdonald's longest term was from 1878 to his death in 1891. As between parties, the Dominion has been under Conservative rule twenty-four years and under Liberal rule

nineteen years, with the prospect of a considerable extension in the future.

The Dominion possesses very great natural resources which are being rapidly developed, a splendid system of railways and waterways, large and swiftly expanding industries, an industrious, thrifty and orderly population. It has excellent political, religious and educational institutions, the fullest civil and religious liberty.

Canada has greatly advanced in status since the first Dominion Day in 1867. We now negotiate our own trade treaties, are beginning the construction of a navy, and have come to realize the wealth, strength and confidence of a nation that has already achieved great things, with still greater achievements in prospect. We feel that we have a splendid heritage and face the future with confidence.

The Grand Jury has condemned the old jail as "obsolete," "altogether unfit for the purposes required" and "a disgrace to the Province." What if some person sent thither by the courts for a minor offence should claim damages from the Province for being incarcerated in such a building?

Again the Canadian prairie country is sweating in heat under hot, dry winds. Here, by the sea, we are having delightful weather. It is to be feared that the spring crops have suffered in the Northwest, but it can hardly be to so great an extent as to warrant the advance of five cents per bushel in wheat. That is speculation. The world's wheat crop, grown in many hands and being harvested in almost every month of the year, governs the price of wheat and will be little affected by a few days of heat in any section of the earth's surface.
