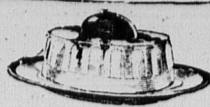

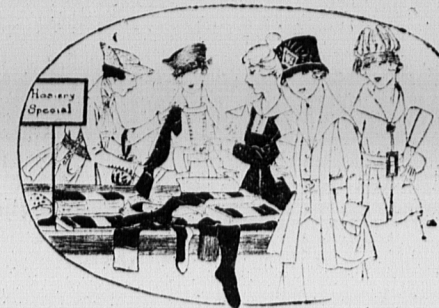

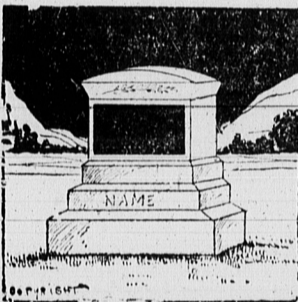

Mrs. John Richards was a passenger to her home in Bideford yesterday afternoon.

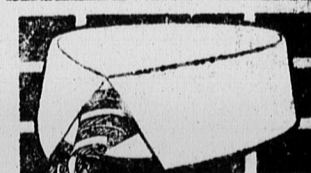
Mr. A. B. Burns, representing Henry K. Wampole Co., of Perth, Ont., is in the city on his annual visit.
