## Display Old Form In Turning Back Willow Parks 5-2

### Gateways Remain In Running For Nova Scotia Title By Winning Third Game Of Series—Result Of First Game Undecided

(Canadian Press)  
YARMOUTH, N. S., Sept. 5.—Flashing some of the form that brought them last year's Nova Scotia title, Yarmouth Gateways lashed back at Halifax Willow Parks today and took the third game of their semi-final series in the Provincial baseball playdowns. Gateways bunched nine hits off Gerald O'Neill for five runs as Lefty Shoads held the Parks to two tallies.  
It was Yarmouth's first win of the five-game series. They dropped the first two at Halifax, but a protest left the result of the second game still undecided. The Nova Scotia Baseball Association called the game "no contest" but the Halifax team carried a counter-protest to the Maritime Provinces branch of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada.  
Until the protested game has been settled, Gateways and Willow Parks are fighting it out for a playoff berth without knowing each team's status. If Halifax is awarded the game, the Parks will need only one more win to take the series. If, on the other hand, it is ruled out, the teams will be on even terms with one victory apiece.

## REPORT SAYS VINES TO TURN PRO.

### United States Amateur Champion Upon Hearing Report Makes Denial.

PARIS, Sept. 4.—(A.P.)—Martin Plaa, the French professional tennis star, declared today that Elsworth Vines, United States amateur champion, will join Henri Cochet in turning professional and meet in a Franco-American series of matches at the United States in January.

### Vines Denies Report

Vines, who is defending his American championship this week in the tournament at Forest Hills, recently was given a clean amateur bill by the United States Lawn Tennis Association after an investigation in the reports about his plans to turn professional. Vines denied he had any offers under consideration.  
"I have never talked with Plaa about any professional proposal and I have made no arrangements whatever with him or anybody else for anything of that kind," Vines told the Associated Press today.

### Cochet Turns Professional

PARIS, Sept. 4.—(A.P.)—Martin Plaa, leading French professional tennis player, today announced that Henri Cochet, France's leading amateur, had turned professional and would play with him against big Bill Alden and Bruce Barnes in a series starting here Sept. 22.

## HAMILTON MAN LEADS FIELD ON FIRST DAY

### Albert A. Adams leading By Two Strokes in Hunt For Dominion Senior Golf Title.

SEIGNORY CLUB, Que., Sept. 5.—Albert A. Adams, Hamilton, tonight had taken the favored position at the 18-hole mark in the 36-hole medal tournament for the Dominion Senior Golf Title by negotiating the Seignory Club course in 79, nine over par, and two strokes better than any other of the 90 entrants.  
It was a day of considerable surprises in the matter of scoring, but it paved the way for a final 18-hole round which promises much excitement. Two strokes behind Mr. Adams came H. C. F. Poste of Cornwall, Ont., with an 81, and one stroke farther back was F. A. Parker of Toronto. Between these three it appears, lies the championship, unless some of the established senior stars are able to approach the Seignory Club course par of 70 tomorrow.  
George L. Robinson of Toronto, the defending champion, posted an 86, which gives him a fighting chance to retain the honors he won in his home city last year. J. Dix Fraser of Toronto, who won the championship in 1931 at Mount Brum, turned in an 85, and the conscientious golfer from Rosedale is looked on in many quarters as a real threat to regain the title.  
M. M. Pike headed the Montreal delegation with 43-44-87. He was followed by N. A. Timmins with a 91. J. H. Maher had 92 and William Duncan 93.  
The prize winners in today's competition are headed by Mr. Adams who takes a special award for the best gross score of the day. The prize for the best net score goes to F. A. Parker of Toronto whose 82 gave him a net of 69.  
Following the medal play, a putting competition was held on the green at the Log Chateau and the winner proved to be L. W. Mitchell of Toronto with 57 strokes. A tie resulted for second place. H. C. F. Poste of Cornwall and A. G. Donaldson of Toronto each had 39 and shared the second prize.

## Record Entry In Totem Pole Golf Tourney

JASPER PARK LODGE, Alta., Sept. 4.—With a record breaking entry registered the eighth annual Totem Pole Golf tournament was set in motion here yesterday when the mens handicap against par was carded.  
Although a cool wind prevailed making low scoring condition rather difficult many extremely low cards were turned in and the competition resulted in a tie between W. Pigott of Seattle and Harry Keough of Saskatoon, both of whom turned in cards of one down to par a most creditable performance.  
His Honor Lieutenant Governor W. L. Walsh officially opened the tournament this morning when he drove off in the qualifying round for the Totem Pole Trophy. Close to two hundred men and women are assembled here as competitors with a similar number as interested guests. Among those who teed off today are Sir Archibald Murray Deputy Governor of the Hudson's Bay Company, P. A. Chester, Canadian General Manager, Capt. C. Tryon A. D., to His Excellency The Governor General, Sir Arthur Worley and His Honor the Lieutenant Governor of Alberta.

## PRICES LOWER IN N.Y. STOCK EXCHANGE

NEW YORK, Sept. 5.—(A.P.)—Declining commodity markets provided an unfavorable background for stocks today and prices dragged lower in quiet trading.  
With wheat heavy and cotton influenced by private estimates placing the crop above the government's August 1 forecast, stocks droned through the first few hours with slight changes, mostly recessions. Toward the close, however, offerings increased and quotations gave ground readily, just as they had a day. Net losses of 1 to 4 points or more were plentiful. Volume totaled 1,253,040 shares.  
Gold mining issues were fairly firm at times. Chemicals bogged down, allied lowering 7 net and Du Pont and Union Carbide nearly 3. U. S. Steel and Bethlehem each lost a couple of points. Farm implements sympathized with grain markets, while rails and wet shares skidded. New York Central, National Distillers, Santa Fe, U. S. Industrial Alcohol, Case and Union Pacific flopped approximately 4 points. American Telephone, American Can, General Electric, General Motors, Chrysler, Montgomery Ward, Sears Roebuck, Standard Oil of New Jersey, Consolidated Gas, Western Union, Harvester and Southern Pacific dipped to 3 net.

## U.S. PRESIDENT MAKES PLEA TO BANKERS

CHICAGO, Sept. 5.—President Roosevelt told United States bankers today he expects them to unleash the flow of credit and enable industry and commerce to take the fullest advantage of the National Recovery Act.  
"I am confident you will work with me to meet the credit needs of industry and trade," he said in a speech read before the annual convention of the American Bankers Association, attended by 5,000 bankers from over the country.  
Two of the administration's spokesmen, Governor Eugene R. Black of the Federal Reserve Board and Chairman Jesse H. Jones of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, expressed in even stronger tones a demand that banks loosen their credits.
