REV. DR. HEARTZ PREACHED AT SCENE OF HIS LABORS OF 58 YEARS AGO.

AMHERST, July 2.—Rev. Dr. Hertz returned yesterday from the Mirimichi district, N.B., where he has been assisting at the opening of a new church. The event must have been of peculiar interest to Dr. Hertz, for it was in this small community, sixteen miles back of Newcastle, where he began his ministry more than 58 years ago. Before his day services were held in the kitchen of a good old lady named Mrs. Shaddick, but subsequently a small sized church was built. Later, a more modern edifice was erected and now the congregation have a building, splendidly built attractive in all its appointments, and capable of seating 250 people. It is the only Protestant church within an area of 12 miles. The opening services began Saturday evening with an address by Dr. Hertz, and on Sunday people flocked from a distance of 15 and 20 miles. It being a fine day a number brought their baskets with them, and spent all day in attending the services of the church. Rev. Dr. Steel of St. John preached in the morning, Rev. Mr. Ives of Margate, P.E.I., a former pastor, in the afternoon, and Rev. Dr. Hertz closed this celebration in the evening, taking as his text, the lady service with the barley loaves and fishes. The whole day was one of intense interest, this church being filled to overflowing at all the services, and the collections totalling over \$400. There is only a small debt of \$250 resting on the church, but this will soon be provided for. What the venerable doctor's emotions were in standing in the place where he first began pulpit utterance nearly sixty years ago, among the children and grandchildren of his early parishioners, can probably be better imagined than described.


