HOUSEHOLD HINTS Lumpy brown sugar should always be rolled to a smooth consistency before measuring. The measuring cup should be packed solidly and the top leveled off.

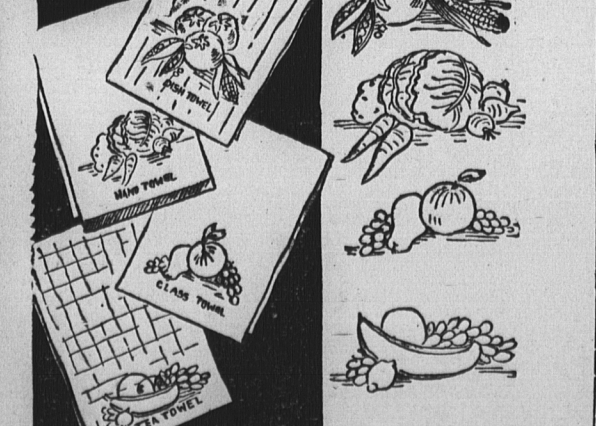
