

BOY OF 11 ROBS GIRL ON BRIDGE

BOSTON, Sept. 25.—An 11-year-old boy held up and robbed of a handbag containing \$20 Miss Bertha McLeod of 14 Newbury street yesterday afternoon on the Berkeley street bridge.

The juvenile burglar, leaving a group of playmates, boldly stepped up to the young woman, demanded her handbag and then wrenched it from her hand after a short struggle.

The boy, described as bright-eyed and smiling, with exceedingly soiled clothes, committed the theft with as much skill as if he had been tutored by a Fagin, according to Miss McLeod's report to the Back Bay Police.

She said she noticed as she passed a crowd of boys that one, not more than 11 years old, cast suspicious glances at her handbag.

Besides the \$20 the bag contained a new pair of gloves, a handkerchief, some calling cards and a key.

ONE KILLED IN TRAIN WRECK.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Sept. 25.—The Pennsylvania eighteen-hour flyer between Chicago and New York, was in collision thirty minutes after leaving this city, early yesterday morning, killing one trainman, injuring four others and one passenger.

The train had left this city at 12.50 and after passing the freight yards, where there are crossover tracks entering the yard, the train was held up by the towman near Larimer, 20 miles East of here.

It is thought that the towerman, anxious at the delay to the flyer, in his hurry threw the wrong levers of the interlocking switch system. Seven freight cars were derailed, blocking the four tracks for several hours.

None of the passenger cars left the track. The flyer was provided with a new locomotive and proceeded east three hours late. It was after 6 o'clock before all tracks were cleared and six other trains that had been delayed were able to proceed.

S. E. Campbell, fireman on the flyer, was caught between the tender and the cab of his engine and crushed so that he died before he could be removed from the scene.

CHICAGO COUPLE CAUGHT SMUGGLING

NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—A rubber stocking and petticoat with fifteen pockets in it are the means by which Rudolph Newman, a Chicago jeweler, and his wife are alleged to have tried to smuggle diamonds and other precious stones and jewelry into this country today.

The couple arrived on the steamer New Amsterdam, of the Holland-American line, accompanied by two small children Newman when arraigned furnished \$2,000 bail, while Mrs. Newman was paroled on her own recognizance on account of her two children, who needed her care.

There has not been such a flagrant case of alleged smuggling reported at the custom house in months past, in fact since the rigid system adopted by Collector Loeb went into effect. In the rubber stocking which Newman wore tied about the lower portion of his body the customs officials found a quantity of uncut diamonds valued at \$1,500, while the pockets of his wife's petticoat contained numerous packages of small jewelry, including a number of garnets and other stones said to be worth about \$5,000. All the jewels were seized.

Had it not been for the fact that Newman was under suspicion because of his frequent trips to Europe, the gems would have probably remained undetected, the officials said, so artfully were they concealed.
