**IN LOVING MEMORY OF THE LATE HARRY McDONALD.**

In the midst of life we are in death. Seldom has the truth of this been so deeply impressed upon us as in the demise of the late Harry McDonald, a native of Crapaud, P. E. Island, which took place at Seattle on May 3rd last, after a lingering illness. Deceased was born at Crapaud on March 27, 1879, and has therefore been called away in the prime of life. Sober, industrious and honest in all his dealings, he made a host of friends in the land of his adoption who mourn today with the dear ones of his home and all his acquaintances, among whom Harry was a popular favorite. He left home ten years ago and has since resided in the vicinity of Seattle, where he was manager of the Pleasant Beach Hotel for the past seven years. On the Sunday following his death funeral services were conducted by the Rev. Dr. Shaylor of St. Mark's Episcopal Church at the chapel of Butterworth's undertaking parlors and were largely attended by Islanders and other friends of deceased. On learning that his recovery was doubtful, his mother, Mrs. Peter McDonald, left for his bedside, but only arrived there two days after her beloved son had entered his eternal rest. On May 18th the remains left for the Island accompanied by Mrs. McDonald and another son, Walter. They arrived here on Tuesday, May 24, and on the following Thursday his remains were interred in St. John's Episcopal Cemetery at Crapaud. The funeral services were conducted at St. John's Episcopal Church by the Rev. Mr. Dobbie, who was assisted at the house by the Rev. Wm. M. Field. The procession was one of the largest ever seen in this section of the country, showing the very high respect in which deceased was held by all who knew him. The pall-bearers were: Wm. McVittie, Calvin McDonald, Chron McVittie, Arthur Inman, Jessie Laird and Harry Best. Father and mother, Peter and Mrs. McDonald; two sisters, Mamie and Phoebe, and four brothers, Joseph, Walter and Lloyd of Seattle, and Wilmot at home, are left to mourn the loss of a kind and dutiful son and brother. To these is extended the deepest sympathy of all friends and neighbors in their sad bereavement. To all mourning ones we would offer the solacing thought: Dust, thou art, to dust returneth, was not spoken of the soul, the loved one now absent from this life has gone to that better one in the Heavenly home of God's people.—Com.

One of the finest stockings seen this season is owned by John Cameron of Charlottetown, and was foaled on the morning of May 26th. He is a handsome, stoutly built colt, sired by the trotting stallion Aquila, grandson of Bingen (2.06), 1st dam the great race mare Betsy Cameron (2.29), by Bronze Chief, 2nd dam Fair Ellen T. By Allright, 3rd dam Minnie Grey (2.30) by Harry Morgan, Minnie Grey grand-dam of Betsy Cameron has the rare distinction of being the first Provincial bred mare to trot to a race record of 2.30 in the Maritime Provinces and the first trotter of any sex to win a race in which the time was 2.30, 2.29, 2.29. She won the free-for-all at Charlottetown in September, 1891, in the above time beating Lady Pilot (2.30), by Black Pilot (2.30), Lucy Derrick (2.32), by Allright, and Black Bird (2.33), by Allright. From the above breeding, it looks as though Mr. Cameron has the making of a great stake colt.
