Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of vacant Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entries by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in one of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required and where residence is performed in the vicinity.

Mrs. John D. MacDonald, of Glen Martin, has received word that her son, Pte. Ewen MacDonald, died December 14th, 1918, of influenza in Hospital in England.

The following letter was received from a nurse who attended him. December 14th, 1918 Ryeot, No. 13 Can. Gen Hospital, Hastings, England.

My Dear Mrs. MacDonald I really cannot find words to write. By this time you know that your son passed beyond this world and gone to reap the reward that our brave wonderful boys will get from the Great King.

I was Ewen's night Sister, and was with him at the last. He was very sick when he came into our Hospital and of course he was in a very miserable condition and could not throw off the attack of influenza.

He was very bright and very good, and enjoyed being joked about "the Island." For a few days we had every hope that the attack would not be serious but, as is so often the case with flu, the change was extremely sudden then almost before we realized it he was gone.

You will be glad to know that a minister had been to see him, and he was not at all worried about going, only he wanted to see his mother once more.

I am sending you something I feel you would like, and I am so very sorry, and wish I could let you understand just how I do feel.
