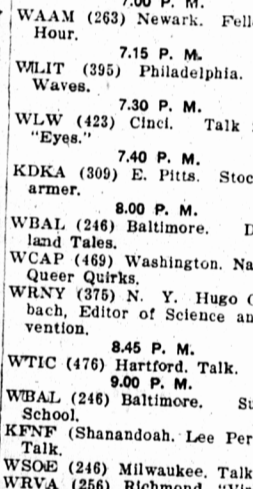


Alan Cobham, who left England June 30 to fly to Australia and back by seaplane, reached Port Darwin, South America, Thursday. He flew from the Dutch East Indies in the final hop.

Since 1910 the province of Saskatchewan has erected 5,151 miles of telephone pole lines, has opened 281 new exchanges, and 364 toll lines. There is a telephone installation for every eight of the population.

Duty collected on Canadian imports in 1925 amounted to \$137,858,088, compared with \$123,162,731 in 1924. The average ad valorem rate on total imports in 1925 was 75.5 per cent. and in 1924, 15.2 per cent.

Canada, which has the world's largest kraft wrapping paper mill, exported 20,535 tons of this paper in 1925, even China and Japan taking considerable quantities. Output of the United Kingdom, New Zealand and South Africa were the largest consumers.

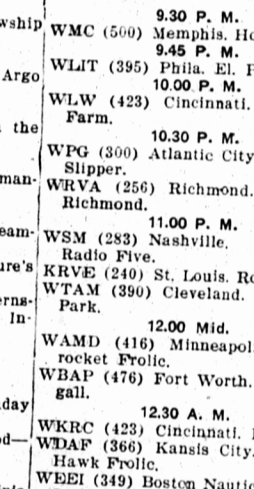
