WORK STARTED.—Excavation work has started on the site of Dalton Hall, the large addition which is to be made to St. Dunstan's College, according to the recently accepted plans prepared by the firm of C. B. Chappell & Hunter, architects.

CHURCH CHANGES.—Rev. F. L. Bertram, of Westfield (N. S.), has accepted an invitation to Campbellton, and Rev. E. E. Styles, of Souris, (P. E. I.) to succeed Rev. G. F. Dawson, M. A., at Alberton.

TO BUILD GARAGE.—The city contemplates building a temporary garage for the storing of the motor sprinkler. It is not definitely decided where to locate it. If no other convenient site can be found the garage will be built in the gateway to the north of the city building between the barn and the building proper.

PRODUCE FOR SYDNEY.—The schooner Kimberly, has about completed loading a general cargo of potatoes at C. Lyons & Company's wharf. This cargo is being loaded by Hon. L. Wood for the Sydney market. The Kimberly will sail the first favorable wind and will be the first produce-laden schooner to sail from Charlottetown this season.

CHURCH OF ENGLAND.—A number of well known clergy and laymen were in Halifax last week for the meetings of the Diocesan Missionary Board, Widows' and Orphans' fund committee of the Synod of the Church of England in Nova Scotia. Among them were Venerable Archdeacon Martell and Draper; Rev. T.W. Murphy of Prince Edward Island; Rev. W. H. Godfrey, and Rev. A. W. Nicholls, of Cape Breton; Rural Dean Diblee and B. D. Bent, of Amherst; and Rev. W. P. Robertson, of Truro.

NATIONAL SERVICE MEETING.—At Murray Harbor Thursday evening a branch of the National Service League was organized by Judge Stewart, who presided, and Professor Clark of the Experimental Station, both of whom gave excellent addresses explaining the object of the League, the great necessity of increasing food production during the present year, and the best methods of accomplishing this. Giddings, Abney; Henry Sharand, Cac'One; A. D. McDonald, Beach Point; David Brooks, Murray Harbor. Addresses were also given by Mr. W. H. Prowse, Rev. Mr. Brown and others.

REGISTRATION OFFICE OPEN.—The National Service League has opened an office in Mr. G. J. McCormack's premises on Ken Street, for the enrolment of volunteers for farm labor. It is desirable that volunteers will enrol themselves promptly in order to facilitate the work.

WAS OVERSEAS.—Rev. George S. Mitchell was recently inducted to the pastorate of the Presbyterian church in Summerside (P. E. I.) Mr. Mitchell is a brother of Rev. T. A. Mitchell, of Sussex (N. B.), and spent some time overseas with the Dalhousie medical unit.

SAYS BUSINESS IS GOOD.—Mr. D. Rutherford, representing the well-known firm of J. & M. Murphy, Ltd., Halifax, is in Charlottetown on one of his regular business trips. Mr. Rutherford is one of the best known and most popular commercial men on the island. He has been coming to P. E. Island for twenty-three years and declares that business is top-top at the present time throughout the province, and his Nova Scotia district.

OF LOCAL INTEREST.—Malta the Nurse of the Mediterranean, is the title of a recent book written by Rev. Albert G. MacKinnon, senior Presbyterian chaplain at Malta, and brother of Rev. Principal MacKinnon, of Halifax, now chaplain overseas. The hospitals in Malta have done a great work for the wounded soldiers from the Dardanelles, Egypt and Salonika. Not less than 80,000 patients have been treated since the beginning of the war.

DROP IN POTATOES.—Word was received yesterday of a break in the potato market, owing to the Southern stock, more particularly from Florida. This is having a tendency to reduce prices throughout Eastern Canadian markets, and indications are that there will be a further decline, as the pits in Alberta and Manitoba are being opened up and carloads from the prairie provinces are beginning to arrive freely in Toronto and Montreal.

SAILING FOR IRELAND.—The schooner Alhambra has now finished loading for a port in Ireland. The vessel was bought by Captain Beattie, of Pictou, well known in Charlottetown, last December from Bissetts Ltd., and has been by him sold to British account to be delivered. Captain Beattie has another small vessel in England, which he intends to bring to Halifax for a cargo of deals says a Halifax Exchange.

THREE BOYS SOLDIERS. GIRL NURSE. NOW FATHER WANTS TO ENLIST.

Mr. Weldon L. Crossman of the Boston Journal, one time foreman of the Patriot Composing Room, sends the following clipping to The Guardian:

Here's a man who is not only proud to have raised his three boys to be soldiers and his daughter to be a Red Cross nurse, but wants to enlist himself!

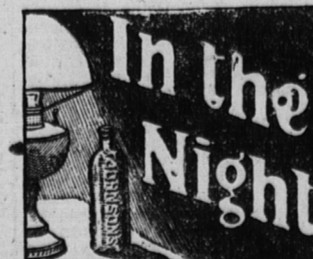
William W. Wadman, 56 Lexington street, East Boston, has no use for "slackers" or any times that deny raising boys to be soldiers. He has two sons already in the fighting ranks; one somewhere in France with the Canadian army; the other in Texas with the United States troops. His youngest son, aged 17 has enlisted in the naval reserve. His daughter is training in a hospital to enlist in the army of the Red Cross. Now his turn has come, he believes, and although he is nearly 50 years old, he is ready to serve. He'd be "de-lighted" to join Teddy and cross the waters for the American flag.

Mr. Wadman is a naturalized American citizen. He was born in Prince Edward Island. All his children were born in East Boston where the Wadman home has been for many years. His oldest son, William Leslie, popularly known as "Les" among the East Boston boys, went to the old home in Canada three years ago to recover from an illness of malaria. In a few months he began to write home for permission to go to the front with the Canadian boys. He was under age and his father at first refused him permission. When he was 21 he sent back word that he was going. His regiment, the 105th, went to France shortly. When heard from last, in March, most of his letters were deleted by the censor. The part left announced that he was well.

Mr. Wadman's second son, James R., is with the 7th United States cavalry in Fort Bliss, Texas. He was in Mexico during last year's scurrillages. Benjamin, the youngest son, wanted to follow his other brother's footsteps and get into the thick of the fighting in France. He changed his mind when the United States declared war, and is now on the list of the naval reserve. The sister Miss Margaret, aged 18, is in a hospital in P. E. I., completing her training as a nurse. She, too, her father promises will be ready to serve the Stars and Stripes.

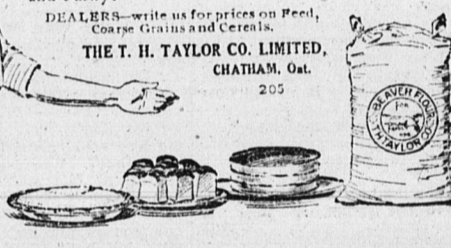
