IN MEMORIAM

MR. JOHN McKAY.

Another landmark and a worthy citizen has been removed and laid to rest in the person of Mr. John McKay of Wood Islands, who departed this life on Friday, Nov. 14th, 1913, in the 70th year of his age, leaving to mourn besides numerous friends and acquaintances, a widow, five sons and five daughters. The sons are: H. W. at home, John R. in Boston, Walter H. in Boston, W. W. at home, and Harry at home. The daughters are: Maud, Mrs. D. McLeod, Boston; Clara, Mrs. Plaut, Boston; Maria, Mrs. M. Gregor, Wood Islands; and Elizabeth in Boston and Bessie at home. Mr. McKay was widely known as a sea-faring man and rigger of ships in the halmy days of ship building in this Province. Mr. McKay was also a member of the Presbyterian Church and a good Christian man. His remains were laid to rest in the Cemetery at Wood Islands. The funeral cortege was large which shows that the deceased was highly esteemed by all who knew him. Patriot and Examiner please copy.

MR. TIMOTHY WEATHERBIE.

A sad gloom was cast over Village Green at 7 p. m., Thursday night when Mr. Timothy Weatherbie passed away in his 94th year. He was in his usual good health up to a week ago when the aged gentleman was stricken with paralysis. The funeral will be held on Sunday at 1 o'clock from his late residence in Village Green. MR. HUGH McLELLAN.

The following further particulars concerning the death of Hugh McLellan, of Vancouver, B. C., have been clipped from the Vancouver Sun:—
Mr. Hugh McLellan, of 1044 Melville street, Vancouver, one of the most widely known and respected of the old-timers of this city, was drowned on Saturday night in the dark waters of the Fraser River, while a heavy fog concealed the banks. The empty boat in which he attempted to cross the river was discovered floating, Sunday morning, near Port Kells, but no trace of Mr. McLellan could be found.

On Saturday night Mr. McLellan crossed the river from his ranch to Fort Hammond, to buy groceries and secure his mail. When he was ready to return he found that the fog was so thick he could scarcely see the length of his boat, so he returned to the shore and purchased a lantern, which he filled with oil and lit, placing it in the end of the boat. He then pushed off in the fog and that was the last seen of him. The next morning the boat was found with one man missing and the lantern still burning in the end, where he had placed it. Since that time every effort has been made to recover the body, but so far fruitlessly.

CITY OLD-TIMER.
Mr. McLellan was one of the first men to settle in the village which eventually became Vancouver. He was widely known and liked among all the old-timers to whom his sudden death will be a severe blow.

ANGUS McWILLIAMS

The session of the First Presbyterian Church, Boston, note with profound sorrow and regret the passing away of a dear friend and colleague Mr. A. McWilliams, who has been for so many years a leading spirit in the work of the congregation. Mr. McWilliams was born in Belfast, P.E.I., in 1842, and was there well Prince of Wales College and graduated in the work he afterwards performed in Boston. He attended in the same class with Chief Justice Sullivan who was always his warm personal friend. In 1842 Mr. McWilliams came to Boston and entered business and soon won substantial success there until loss of health compelled his retirement some twenty years ago. In the year that he came to this city he associated himself with the First Presbyterian Church then worshipping at Beech St., and in connection with the work of the church he spent the last forty years of his life. He was early elected to the eldership and has been for many years the senior elder of the church. He taught a large and successful Bible Class for twenty-five years, and acted as Associate Superintendent of the Sunday School. In every department of the life and work of the church he was an earnest worker, wise counsellor and steadfast friend. Mr. McWilliams was a delegate to the General Assembly, and was invited to address the Court on Temperance, and he was also appointed to officiate at the Communion service with President Harrison, Hon. John Wanamaker, and Gov. Mount of Indiana. Mr. McWilliams was a valued member and secretary of the Presbyterian Ministers' Association where he frequently read much appreciated papers. He was identified with the work of the Y.M.C.A. of the city, and he also very acceptably supplied the pulpit of his denomination in the neighbourhood of the city. In a word there was no intellectual notes of the heart, and congenial people of Boston that did not find in him a friend and supporter. Mr. McWilliams leaves two sisters in Eldon P. E. I. and four children in Boston to mourn his loss and all who admired the talents respected the convictions, enjoyed the friendship, and prized the hospitality of the departed will extend to these lonely and bereaved friends their most sincere sympathy.

NUTMEG CARAMEL FROSTING

Put one and one-fourth cupfuls of brown sugar, one-fourth cupful of white sugar, and one-third cupful of boiling water in saucepan, bring to the boiling point and let boil until syrup will spin a thread. Pour syrup gradually, while beating constantly, on the whites of two eggs beaten until stiff, and continue the beating until mixture is nearly cool. Set pan containing mixture in boiling water and cook over range, stirring constantly, until mixture becomes granular around edge of pan. Remove from pan of water, and beat until mixture will hold its shape. Add vanilla, and one-fourth cupful of English walnut nuts, broken in pieces. Spread on cakes.
