Summerside and Prince County News.

Mr. R. W. Sharp left yesterday morning by the Stanley en route on a trip to Boston and New York.

The Stanley left Summerside yesterday morning with 303 box smelts and a number of passengers. She returned at 1.45 having made the run home in one hour and thirty minutes. There are no new cases of smallpox reported. The freight forwarded will arrive in Boston Friday morning. Had arrangements been made with the N. B. and P. E. I. R. and had the Stanley left Summerside at 7 a. m. these goods and passengers would arrive in Boston or Montreal this morning 24 hours from Summerside.

With the Stanley on the Summerside Cape Tormentine route making daily round trips there is no reason why she should not be carrying the mails. This route when once established will open up communication with the outside world which will doubtless give the people of this province better satisfaction than we have yet had. Did the Stanley leave this port at, say 9 o'clock, (local time) and allowing one hour and forty-five minutes to cross and fifteen minutes to transfer mails and passengers at the Cape connection could be made at Sackville with the C. P. R. train at 12.52 p. m. The traveller could then reach Boston the following morning at 8.25 o'clock—twenty three and a half hours from Summerside. Or the passenger for Montreal could reach his destination at 9.35 a. m.—twenty four and a half hours from Summerside. And did Charlottetown desire to connect, an express train could be put on the P. E. I. R. leaving the capital at 6.30 a. m. Connections could then be made between Charlottetown and Boston in 26 hours or Charlottetown and Montreal in 27 hours. This arrangement would of course depend a good deal on the weather but up to the present time there has been nothing to prevent the carrying out of the above. Under such a system we would be in nearly as good circumstance as in summer. There will of course be stormy days in the season when it would be difficult to make these connections, though should we be favored with a winter like that of last year there would not be any hitch whatever. And even during the most severe crossings the distance being so short ice boats could be used with little loss of time. There seems to be no trouble for the Stanley to keep the way clear and now since everything has worked so favorably let us have some system.

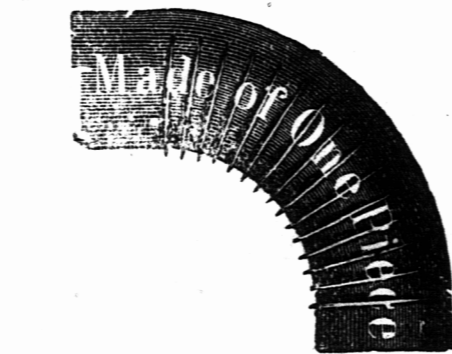
