THREE MONTH'S TRIP TO EUROPE

Mr and Mrs Walter S Grant Arrived Home Monday Night From an Extended Trip to European Countries. Mr Grant Was Acting as Representative for the Canadian National Silver Fox Breeders' Association.

Mr and Mrs Walter Grant arrived home Monday night from an extended visit of three months to the European countries. Mr. Grant was acting as representative for the Canadian National Silver Fox Breeders' Association. This organization had been in the receipt of a number of letters and other correspondence from several European countries, especially from Norway and Sweden, asking information concerning their methods of dealing with the fox industry. The association thought it the best course to send one of their members to give first hand information concerning the inspection, tanning and registration of foxes who at the same time would interview foxmen and officials of fox companies, render assistance to newly formed companies and help in the organization of prospective companies, along the same lines as that of the Canadian National Silver Fox Breeders' Association.

From Germany they travelled to Lucerne Switzerland, and the government are greatly interested in the fox industry, though it has not developed to any great extent. There are two quite large ranches, and more are proposed. There is a silver fox breeders' association, and the man in charge, Dr. Zwicky, of the Government are anxious to see silver fox breeding developed further by the peasant farmers as supplementary to the cattle industry. They are starting in this year to register all their foxes and have a committee of three to pass on the registration. Dr. Zwicky, Professor Collaud, of an Agricultural College, the third being a prominent raw fur buyer. Mr. Grant had a conference with the Swiss Minister of Agriculture, by his own special request, and the request also of the fox breeders' association, to visit Switzerland. He found him very much interested and very sympathetic with the idea of having the business further developed in his country.

Leaving Switzerland they journeyed through Milan, Genoa, San Remo, the Italian and French Riviera, and visited the Casino, that world-famous gambling centre, in Monte Carlo. From the latter place they visited Nice where extensive preparations are being made for the coming winter season—Nice being a well known winter resort. From Nice they went through Marseille to Paris staying here six days. The weather in Paris was more similar to that which we are experiencing at the present time.

While in Norway they visited several cities and towns in the interests of the Fox Association and to view scenes of interest, among which were Bergen, Alesund, Kristiansund, Trondkjim, Herjolfs Orhus and Oslo. At Herjolfs Orhus they met Howard MacKendrick, son of J. C. MacKendrick, Charlottetown, Nova Scotia.

Norway leads in the development of the fox industry there being about 3,000 foxes in that country. Mr. Grant was asked to stay for two months to help with the full inspection of foxes and to train the inspectors. Being unable to do so he called to Mr. James Prichard of Summerside who gave the necessary aid and is now on his return home.

In Stockholm, Sweden, Mr. Grant attended a preliminary organization meeting called on the occasion of his visit to that city. The Swedes are not so far advanced in organization as are the Norwegians but with the formation of an organization things should rapidly develop.

From Helsingborg in Sweden they went to Denmark, stopped off a few days to see the country, then proceeded to Germany. In this country Mr. Grant interviewed Mr. Wildgess, Canadian Trade Commissioner in Hombourg; here he obtained information as to the extent of the fox business in Germany. There are two fox associations in Germany, one in Leipzig the other in Munich. In these places he saw many foxmen. Leipzig has greatly changed and is now merely a fur dressing centre.

Illustrated Lecture
In Hertz Hall
Capt. A. J. Brace, F. R. G. S., for 15 years a Y. M. C. A. Secretary in West China, gave his illustrated lecture with 40 slides on Tibet—the Roof of the World—in Hertz Hall of the United Church last night. He spoke of the unrest in China and traced it to the unsatisfactory relations with Western countries who have unfairly exploited the Chinese for many years and held that no solution would be available until western nations were prepared to recognize Chinese sovereignty and deal fairly with them. He characterized the Chinese as clever, talented with a genius for friendliness, and would respond to friendly overtures but not to force.

The pictures on Tibet were taped on three trips into the Tiberian Mountains exploring unknown country for which the speaker was recognized as a Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society. They were made into slides and beautifully colored by Chinese artists. Mr. Brace is travelling through Canada visiting the Canadian Colleges as Secretary of the Student Movement, and lecturing on China.

THE MARKETS
MONTREAL, Dec. 1.—The foreign demand for Canadian grain on the Montreal market today continued inactive. The domestic trade in coarse grains and also quiet but prices were stronger at one cent per bushel higher. No. 2 C.W. were quoted at 72 and No. 3 C.W. at 68 cents per bushel. A fair trade was done in spring wheat grades of flour and values were well maintained. An easier feeling prevailed in the winter wheat situation but prices were unchanged. The millfeed market continued moderately active and prices were steady. The enquiry for oats was good and the undertone to the market was firm. Prices for all grades of eggs ruled steady and the market was fairly active. The receipts were 708 cases. The butter market was active and firm. No. 1 pasteurized was quoted at 37 cents per pound. The receipts were 143 packages. Some improvement and a moderate trade was transacted. Prices were steady, western grades were quoted at 17-1/2 cents to 18 cents per pound, and eastern at 17-1/2 cents per pound. The receipts were 481 boxes. The bean market was moderately active and car lots of choice white handpicked were quoted at \$2.75 per bushel, and broken lots at \$3.00 per bushel.
