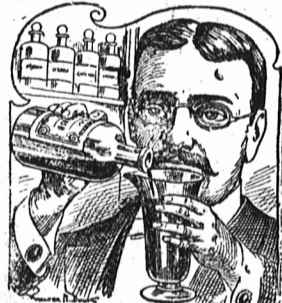

OPPOSITION PRAISE FOR SIR WILFRID

The Toronto World is a staunch Opposition journal, but it has no hesitation in commending Sir Wilfrid Laurier's attitude and action at the Imperial Conference. Here are a few extracts from its commendatory article:

"Canada has reason to be satisfied both with the reception accorded to Sir Wilfrid Laurier in the Mother Land and the part he has taken in the deliberations of the Imperial Conference. His reputation as the Chrysestom of political orators, the charm of his personality and unflinching courtesy and the fact that he is at once the representative of the first among the Outer Britains and the French portion of its people have all combined to make him the most conspicuous figure at the Conference."

The World commends him for making friends of the Boer leader and adds: "Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the World believes, stands for the sane and sober imperialism, founded on a conviction that a closer union of the British states is possible on the basis of co-operation and partnership, while preserving to each self-government and independence of action. Sir Wilfrid deserves high commendation for the course he has pursued, and the World is agreeably surprised at the distance the Dominion Premier has gone in furthering the objects of the Conference."

"Sir Wilfrid Laurier is entitled to a full share of credit for the initial success of the Conference. The increased prestige accruing to him and to Canada cannot fail to modify profoundly the future course of international affairs, so far as the Dominion is concerned. . . . By his presence at the Conference and by supporting closer union he has placed Canada in the best position, for maintaining and protecting her just claims."

This is a warm praise and is discriminating as well. Coming as it does from an able and prominent Ontario journal squarely opposed to him politically, Sir Wilfrid may feel justly proud of the tribute. A majority of the Liberal newspapers of Canada would sound his praises with almost equal loquacity whether he did well or ill. The World's commendation would not have been given to a political opponent except from the conviction that it was well deserved.

Just before prorogation the Canadian Senate resolved to abolish the liquor bar which for many years has been kept open beneath the Chamber.

The New York Sun takes note that "Prince Edward is a place of pure delight in summer and a mighty uncomfortable place in winter." It also tells that in winter, as often as they can, the Islanders "smash through the ice-barrier with heavy steam tugs, and when they cannot smash they grumble." The Sun thinks the Tunnel project will some day be carried out.

A Moncton despatch notes that last Sunday was one of unusual quiet, due to the decision of the I. C. R. authorities to comply, as far as possible with the provisions of the Lord's Day Act as to the running of trains. Special freight trains were rushed on the previous Saturday, but on Sunday no special freights were moving. Regular trains that were on their way at midnight of Saturday were, however, run to their destination as usual. It is well that the Government Railways should observe the law of the land. Acting Minister Fielding deserves commendation for seeing that this is done.

SOME OF OUR MEN.

Prince Edward Island as a small community may be justly proud of the men she has produced in the past, and not less proud of the men of Island birth now noted in the public affairs of our own and other countries. Among the latter may be named the following:

Sir Louis H. Davies, Judge of the Supreme Court at Ottawa.

Sir William McDonald, millionaire manufacturer of Montreal whose gifts to educational institutions have been made on a more than princely scale.

Dr. Jacob Gould Schurman, Principal of Cornell University, sent by the United States to inaugurate the Government of the Philippines.

Dr. Falconer, now invited to become principal of Toronto University at a salary of \$10,000 a year.

J. B. McDonald, contractor for the vast subway system of New York.

There are many others of prominence in various callings, but let these suffice for the present. It is a good showing for a Province of one hundred thousand people.

It is somewhat more than 300 years since the gentle Isaac Walton, the author of The Compleat Angler, was born. Wordsworth has enshrined in a beautiful sonnet "Meek Walton's heavenly memory." Walton lived to the age of ninety a happy and blameless life and followed almost to the last his favorite recreation. The return of the trout season will recall to many contemplative fishermen the charming simplicity, the freshness and poetry, the pure, peaceful and pious spirit, which breathe from the pages of Walton's immortal book. Apropos of all this Father Byrne of Sussex, N. B., the other day landed a two-pounder, which moved the editor of The Telegraph to say that "trout so large as that should not be left at liberty lest they devour the others. 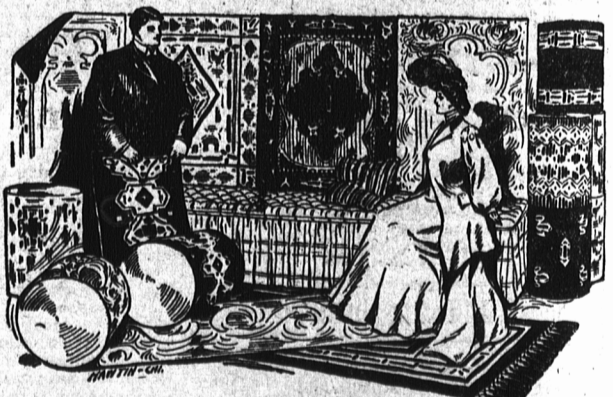
