MANY NATIONS CHEERED THE CANADIANS ON TO VICTORY IN THE OLYMPIC HOCKEY

ST. JOHN, Mar. 3—Bringing back to Canada with them the runner-up championship of the world, which they won at the Olympic games in Chamonix, France, a few weeks ago, the Granites of Toronto, arrived here Saturday night aboard the Canadian Pacific liner Metagama from Liverpool in charge of W. A. Hewitt, manager of the team.

Everywhere they went the Canadians were favorites. Manager Hewitt said, "When Canada played the United States in the final game for world honors, which the Canadians won 6 to 1, the other six nations which had been eliminated all rooted for the Canadians. The final game attracted the largest crowd that ever witnessed a hockey match in Europe. The gate receipts were 53,000 francs. Canadians attended from all over France and Sir Herbert Ames, former M. P. for Montreal, who is now attached to the League of Nations staff, came over from Geneva for the game, bringing with him about thirty Canadians.

In Better Condition. Besides being athletes of superb ability the young Canadians possessed those social graces which made them welcome everywhere. They all spoke enthusiastically of their audience with the Prince of Wales in London about ten days ago. The Prince was the essence of democracy and good-fellowship and he displayed an accurate knowledge of the personnel of the team and the details of the contests in which they had engaged.

Speaking of the final game, both Mr. Hewitt and Duncan Munro, captain of the team, said it was not nearly so rough as some of the accounts in United States papers had pictured it. The Canadians were much faster skaters and just as good or better bodycheckers than the Americans. The Canadians were also in better condition than their rivals. The fact that the United States men carried their sticks high, as Munro said, was responsible for most of the clashes.

With the exception of the English team, which had five former Canadians on it, the Swedes were the best of the European hockey players. All of the teams were good

NEW YORK HEAVYWEIGHT HAS NO IDEA OF BEING AN EASY VICTIM OF FIRPO'S GREAT RIGHT. RIO JANEIRO, Mar. 2.—Al Reich, the United States heavyweight, is not going to Buenos Aires with any idea of being an easy victim of Luis Firpo's powerful right. "This chance at Firpo means everything to me," said Reich, on board the steamer American Legion today, en route to Buenos Aires where he has contracted to fight fifteen rounds with the Argentine star at a charity boxing festival March 16.

"I saw Firpo fight twice, including his fight with Dempsey," added Reich. "I recognize his power and aggressiveness, but I do not believe Dempsey is the only one able to defeat him." Reich expects to weigh in at 210 pounds. He has been training vigorously on board ship and will keep it up the rest of the way so he counts on being in splendid condition when he steps ashore.

RECALLING TWO OF THE DANE'S GREAT BATTLES

Two of the greatest light weight battles in the history of modern boxing were the Gans-Nelson clash in 1906 and the Nelson-Wolgast affair in 1910. In each case Nelson was the loser. Gans won on a foul after 42 hectic rounds and Wolgast tipped the Durable Dane in the fortieth session, Nelson's seconds tossing up the sponge in token of defeat. Wolgast's victory gave Ad the championship. He literally whipped the battler at his own game, staging a remarkable come-back after being all but out in the twenty-third round. The defeat ended the career of Nelson as a top-notch.
