Sox Suffer Fourth Straight Loss As Tigers Triumph 9-1

(Canadian Press)
The runaway Boston Red Sox, needing only one victory over Detroit to clinch the American League flag, were stung again yesterday as Tigers handed them their fourth straight lacing 9-1.
Dick Wakefield's three-run homer in the first inning off Mickey Harris sent Tigers off to a flying start and they coasted in back of Freddie Hutchinson's seven-hit pitching to gain second place from New York Yankees, who lost at Cleveland.
Tigers gave three Boston left-handers acid right-hander Mace Brown rade treatment by walloping out 14 hits as everybody but Skeeter Webb got at least one safety.
Hank Greenberg hoisted his 32nd homer off Earl Johnson in the fifth and Ted Williams produced Boston's only run by belting his 34th four-bagger in the sixth.
Steve Gromek and Cleveland Indians eliminated New York Yankees from the pennant race by defeating the Yankees 4-2.
Gromek, who beat Yankees five straight times without a loss last season, limited the Gotham club to seven hits including Tommy Henrich's 19th round-tripper of the season in the third inning. The Tribe, paced by Don Ross, collected seven safeties off Spud Chandler.
The game was halted 65 minutes during the Cleveland half of the sixth because of rain.
St. Louis Browns, still hoping to top the American League second division, bunched three singles, a walk and an infield out for two runs in the second and went on to break a 2-1 tie and went on to defeat Philadelphia Athletics 5-1.
Tony Piretti, making his first start of the season, held Chicago White Sox to four hits while Washington Senators won an American League game 4-2 before a crowd of 15,435 at Chicago.

OTTAWA, Sept. 10 (CP)—Playing a steady game which stood out particularly in a long shot, little Huot of the Caval-Sur-La-Lac, Que., today shot four under par for a 69-71, 140 in the first 36 holes of the 72-hole Canadian Professional Golfers' Association Medal Play tournament at rain-drenched Rivermead links.
His closest competitor for the winner's share of the \$1,000 prize money and the O'Leary Trophy was Bob Gray of Scarborough, Ont., Toronto, with a 145, who won the 1937 Toronto Mississauga followed with a 146, while W.T. Cunningham of London Hunt Club, who played out 72 in the opening round, drew an 80 in the second for 152.
Only Huot and Gray were under par for the second round, as the soggy links forced most competitors into the late 70s or 80s. Scores at the end of the second round included:
Roland Huot, Montreal, N.B. 77-76-153.
Roderic Huot, Royal Quebec, 80-78-158.
Stan Horne of the Islemere Club Montreal, the pre-tourney favorite, fared badly in the second round. Horne scrambled a seven-over-par 79 which gave him a 153 total for the 36 holes.
Bill Kerr, defending champion, was well behind the leaders with 154.

CBC Regulations Permit Breweries To Sponsor Programs

TORONTO, Sept. 10 (CP)—The CBC has announced new regulations which permit breweries and wine companies in Provinces where advertising of beer and wine is permissible under the Federal Liquor Control Act to sponsor programs of 15 minutes or more subject to certain conditions.
The conditions include: that the announcement of sponsorship should be submitted to the CBC for approval before being broadcast.
Unplaced applicants may not sponsor programs under the new regulations. The Canadian Press reported earlier that the actual situation more advertising of liquor would be permitted.
The old regulations prohibited advertising of alcoholic liquor and the only exception it made for sponsorship of programs by wine and beer companies was in Quebec.

Reigel Shoots Record Golf In Title Play

SPRINGHILL, N. J., Sept. 10 (CP)—Robert (Skeet) Reigel, 31-year-old pilot instructor from Upper Darby, Pa., today won a record for the lowest score at Baltusora to spreadage the field in the 36-hole qualifying round of the National Amateur Championship. The five-under-par score with his 59 in the first 18 Monday gave him a total of 135.
Henry Martell of Edmonton, Canadian Amateur Champion, qualified in a play-off among 13 with 36-hole totals of 132 for the last eight places to qualify for tomorrow's match play.
He scored a wobbly 78 today to go his 74 in the initial round Monday.
Not only did Reigel's brilliant 67-65 out and 32 back-supply the competitive course mark of 68 set jointly on Monday by Capt. Cary Middlecott of Memphis and Howard Everett of Philadelphia, but his two-round total also eclipsed the previous qualifying record of 139 set in the 1939 amateur by Tom Sheehan, Jr. of Chicago.
The two great rounds, which clipped eight strokes off Baltusora's fairly exacting par, won the medal for Reigel by the wide margin of five blows and established him firmly as the man to beat in tomorrow's play-off for the flying leader each at 141, were Smiley Quirk, the National Public Links champion from Inglewood, Calif., and George Hobbish of Royal Oak, Mich. Tied at 143 were Dick Chapman, the 1940 champion, and Ray Billows, twice runner-up for the amateur title.
All the "name" amateurs who figured in pre-tournament speculation desisted at the entrance test. Marvin (Bud) Ward who won the last championship played in 1941 and still holds the title racked up totals of 78-73-151 to qualify con-

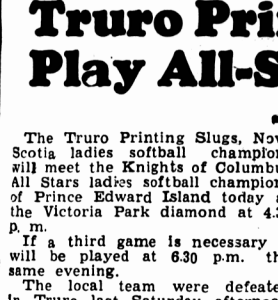

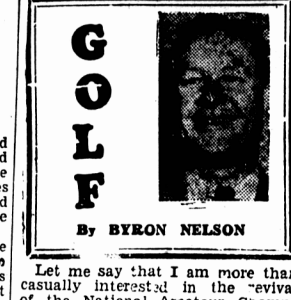
Baseball Playoffs At S' Side Today

St. Leger Will Be Raced Today

DOMCASTER, Youghair, England, Sept. 10 (Reuters)—England's oldest classic race the St. Leger will be raced today for the first time since 1938 with pre-race forecasts pointing to one of the most open events in the 189-year history of the race.
J.E. Ferguson's grey colt, Alcorn, surprise winner of the Epsom Derby last June, holds a slight edge among the favorites but must overcome the flux in the St. Leger that has pursued Derby winners since 1938, when Bahamut won both the Derby and the St. Leger.
Gulf Stream, owned by Lord Derby and second at Epsom, is considered a chance to upset Alcorn this time and there is some "sight-unsure" support for the French invader, Marcel Hussin. Niral, reported recovering good form after an early-season illness. The St. Leger has not been won by a French horse since 1871.
The race will be run over a distance of 1-3/4 miles, with weather forecasts indicating sticky footing.



Soccer Players Threaten Strike

LIVERPOOL, Sept. 10 (CP)—Liverpool soccer players threatened a strike today over a threatened strike among British professional soccer players. No statement was issued. It marked the first time the government has intervened in soccer's domestic affairs.
The players union committee meets in Manchester Thursday to consider replies from a postal ballot on the wages question which may lead to a walkout. One of the chief demands is an increase in the maximum weekly wage from £10 (\$40) to £12 (\$48).

Dodgers Blank Reds Behind Three-Hit Pitching Of Melton

Behind the three-hit pitching of Rube Melton and a 10-hit attack on four Cincinnati hurlers, Brooklyn Dodgers trounced the Reds 8-4 yesterday for their sixth straight National League victory.
The fast ball right-hander had little difficulty in handcutting the weak-hitting Reds. Dain Clay was the only Rinelander to solve the Carolinian's offerings. Clay collected two of his team's hits a double in the first and a single in the sixth.
Brooklyn sewed up the game in the initial inning, jumping on starter Ed Heusser for three runs with Ed Stevens knocking in all three runs by doubling with the sacks jammed.
Bruce Edwards led the Dodgers' assault with two singles and a double.
Boston Braves climbed within 3 1-2 games of third-place Chicago by defeating the Cubs 10-2 behind Johnny Sain who outlasted five Cub pitchers for his 17th victory. Tom Neill, up from Birmingham's Association, in five trips to the plate walked and singled, scored twice and knocked in one run. In the field he made one putout and made a great try to pick Bob Schefsky's double off the left field wall.
The pace-setting St. Louis Cardinals opened their final eastern trip of the season with a 4-1 win over Philadelphia Phillies. The victory kept the Cards two games ahead of the pursuing Brooklyn Dodgers.
Pittsburgh opened its last eastern season with a 7-4 win over New York that dropped the Giants to within four percentage points of the last place Pirates.

Red Sox Office Deluged For World Series Tickets

BOSTON, Sept. 10 (AP)—A cloudburst of mail and telegrams inundated the office of Boston Red Sox today with a flood of applications for World Series tickets which officials estimated would aggregate 500,000.
The deluge began when carriers staggered into the American League club's offices with a batch of 80,000 letters in 25 mail sacks, and Western Union messengers lugged in a preliminary load of 9,000 telegrams.
Staggered Red Sox officials posted the following instructions to employees: "Reject all applications coming from outside New England."
