LONDON, April 13.—(Special.)—Canadian clerks here are exercised over the official announcement that the War Office will exclude all but British beef for supplies of fresh meat for the army. One official said "Surely Canadian meat is British," but some doubt exists whether this view will prevail.

SUICIDE AVERTED

Strychnine Taken to End Her Days.

CONDITION IMPROVED

Girl's History Previous to Arrival in Ch'town Taken From an Exchange.

On Friday afternoon a young woman accosted Captain McLean of the Princess at Pictou asking him for free transportation to Charlottetown. After hearing her story the Captain permitted her to take passage. On the way over she was seized with what those on board termed fits, but she afterwards admitted they were spasms caused by the use of strychnine. According to her own statement she had taken poison just before the boat sailed.

After arrival in Charlottetown Mr. Peter Stewart drove her to the home of Mr. John Fraser who she stated at the time was her uncle. After remaining there for some time she took quite ill. A doctor was sent for and after he arrived he found that the young woman had developed symptoms of poisoning. Upon questioning the patient she admitted to having taken some three grains of strychnine in order to commit suicide. Mr. Stewart was sent for and she was removed to the Hospital. On the way out her condition became very alarming and upon the order of the doctor the team was stopped as the patient was becoming breathless and pulseless. Fortunately she revived and the alarm of the moment was over.

In conversation with Dr. Shaw she stated that she had written to her uncle 3rd. Avenue New York near 14th street, but he had not replied. She is apparently not suffering from mental derangement and simply tried to commit suicide. Late accounts state that she is recovering and will be able to leave the hospital in a few days.

case says:—The young woman Ann Barrington referred to in these columns some weeks ago as having been found on the train at Stellarton in a sick and destitute condition is still at the Waverley House, being cared for by Mrs. Davidson, at the expense of the town and charitable women associated with the W. C. T. U. The latter, after exercising all the tact and persuasive ability with which the fair sex are credited, have been unable to learn anything of the young woman's identity. She is described as of comely appearance, refined in manners and well educated. She tells a story of having a rich uncle in New York, a stock-broker, who desired her to proceed to Charlottetown to take back to New York a child related to them. The uncle cannot be located. Miss Barrington spent some days in Truro, at the expense of that town where she made similar statements. She is either mentally deranged or is an expert at "working" kindly disposed people. When she arrived in Pictou she was poorly clad and was frequently seized with fits. A Windsor lady who visited Pictou was told of the girl and called upon her. The lady at once recognized the sick one and called her by name, but "Anna" declared she was not so and so and had never seen her questioner. The girl is improving in health now and the Poor Committee should get rid of her, by sending her to her home if she has one, or to the Provincial authorities.

The lectures by Rev. Mr. Fullerton, of Charlottetown, on Monday and Tuesday evenings, were not so well attended as they should have been. He gave very interesting accounts of the experiences of the First Canadian Continent in South Africa, and illustrated his remarks with stereopticon views.—Pictou Advocate.

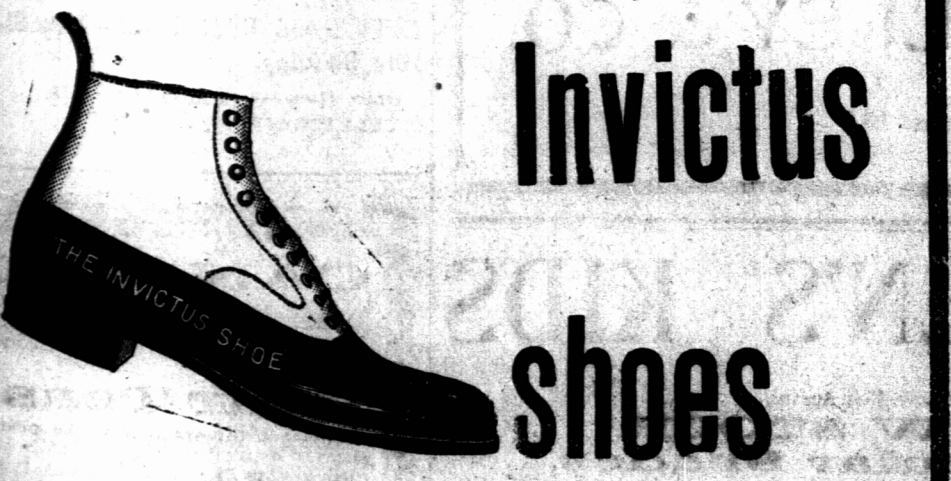
