BRIG OUT IN TWO BY STEAMER. VALUABLE LIMESTONE AREAS LOCATED.

SYDNEY, Sept. 16.—The Post was informed this morning that a very valuable and extensive deposit of limestone situated at the head of Whyococmagh Bay, between Orange Dale and Whyococmagh near the Indian Reserve has been bonded by Major Burton, R. E., of London, England. It is understood that the quality and quantity of the ore there is satisfactory in every respect, the material being suitable for the manufacture of an excellent brick, stone, bottles, etc. The market for these articles is said to be ample, and the shipping facilities during the navigable season of the year, near the deposits are excellent.

Major Burton has the confidence of men in London and high financial standing who will undertake the development of the property when it is conclusively proven to them that the proposition is a good one. As is usual in matters of this kind, the promoters are out after valuable concessions in the way of exemptions, bonuses and subsidies from the Municipalities and Governments. It is further understood that Major Burton proposes, if all goes well, to erect in this city a \$500,000 plant for the manufacture of the articles above named from the rough limestone. For this he asks certain concessions from the civic government which are not yet given for publication.

RAIN MARRED EUCHARISTIC CONGRESS.

VIENNA, Sept. 15.—The brilliancy of the great procession concluding the twenty-third Eucharistic Congress today was greatly marred by a continuous downpour of rain and a chilly temperature. From seven o'clock in the morning until one in the afternoon, when the Emperor visited the Papal legate, Cardinal Van Rossum, with the Host, rain fell unrelentingly, drenching many thousands walking in the procession as well as the thousands of spectators along the route. Under such conditions it was impossible to hold the celebration of Mass in the open air. As was intended, the procession simply passed through the Heiden-Platz from the Ring-strasse into the inner court of the Hofburg, where the Papal legate, the Cardinals, the Emperor, the Archduke Franz Ferdinand entered the Hofburg Chapel and deposited the Host.

AMERICANS WIN PALMA TROPHY

OTTAWA, Sept. 15.—Americans won the Palma trophy by eight points. The shooting at the first range was remarkable. At this range in the last Palma competition at Rockcliffe, the Americans got such a lead that there was no hope of catching them. Out of a possible of 800 points yesterday, the Canadians only dropped seven and the Americans ten. On the first round of four men, the Canadians only dropped one point. They made 59 bulls out of 60 shots. Russel put in 17 bulls in succession, two being sighters. The second rounds had a little harder weather conditions and consequently lost more points. DISMISS HAYES FROM POLICE FORCE.

NEW YORK, Sep. 14.—Deputy Police Commissioner Douglas R. McKay today held Cornelius G. Hayes, former inspector of police, guilty of having made a false statement and dismissed him from the police force. The charge against Hayes was made by Commissioner Waldo as an outcome of the vice scandal in this city. The dismissal of the former inspector caused a stir at headquarters, as it was thought that he had substantiated his claims to a certain extent at the recent hearing and that the punishment would not be as severe as that handed out.

The order dismissing Hayes became effective at noon today. It was signed by McKay, acting commissioner, in the absence of Rhinelander Waldo. McKay refused to make any comment on the case. He said that he had the power to dismiss Hayes from the service, but would not say whether he had exercised that power or whether the order had been issued at the direction of Waldo.

Since the charges made against Hayes by Commissioner Waldo it is stated that Hayes was informed by friends high up in the department that he faced ultimate dismissal, and that the system would endeavor to place the blame for grafting at his door. Hayes made a strong effort to vindicate himself, and although he succeeded to a certain extent, he failed to make it as strong as he hoped to make it.
