### THE LORD'S DAY ACT IN WORKING.

The Ottawa Journal in a recent issue made the statement that the Lord's Day Act had made good by cutting in two the business hitherto done on Sundays. The latest issue of the Lord's Day Advocate makes it clear that a great and good work is being effected by means of the Act. It tells of cases against the Grand Trunk Railway and other railways being successfully prosecuted, and of other cases in which railway companies had been not fined by the Attorney General of Ontario that they had violated the law, which must be enforced, and that thereupon promises were made that such violations would not be repeated.

One of the places where Sunday merchandising had been extensively carried on was at Niagara Falls, notably in the sale of curios and souvenirs. On complaint being made, Attorney General Foy ordered prosecution of the offenders, and all those prosecuted as principals except two were convicted and fined \$25 each and a number of employees were fined \$5 each. Like our own Prohibitory Law, the Lord's Day Act is still violated at times, but not openly with impunity. It has greatly diminished Sunday trading, excursions, games, theatres and other amusements to which an admission fee is charged.

In connection with Sunday observance within the Dominion, it may be mentioned that other countries are moving along similar lines. Belgium, a Roman Catholic country, has recently abolished by statute 2,427 Sunday trains on the rail ways there. Switzerland had before taken action to secure 52 days of rest in the year for every railway and trolley worker. In both these countries the cutting down of Sunday railway traffic resulted in a notable diminution of accidents. The reduction of fatalities on Belgian railways was over 50 per cent, while in Switzerland there was not in the first twelve months a single fatal accident on railway or trolley line.

A fact of wide significance is the edict issued by the Emperor of China commanding the observance of the Sabbath throughout his vast Empire. Moreover in all the Chinese embassies in Christian countries the representatives of China are commanded to close their offices on Sundays. Speaking of this the New York Observer says:—"It sets the stamp of government approval on Christianity as the religion of the leading nations of the earth, and gives Christian missionaries a standing before the Chinese people which they have never enjoyed before."

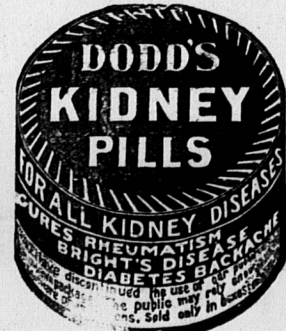
### Y. M. C. A. ANNUAL MEETING.

It will not be surprising if hereafter he gravitates a little more toward the Opposition in federal affairs.



The Saint John Telegraph enumerates nine different steamers plying on the St. John River and its tributaries which have been burned within the last few years. This is a terrible record, in view of the limited number of vessels engaged on that river. Worst of all five lives were lost in these disasters, and scores of others had hairbreadth escape. It seems incredible that so many fires could have occurred by accident if reasonable care had been observed, and in one or more instances there were strong suspicions of incendiarism.
