STRATHCONA PRIZES FOR PHYSICAL TRAINING

A good deal of interest is being taken by teachers and pupils in the important subject of physical training in the schools, and one of the results therefrom is sure to be an improved physique in the rising generation. Thanks to the encouragement given by the Militia Department in the way of good instruction and a bonus of \$15 dollars to successful teachers, practically all the teachers in the province have obtained a Grade "B" Physical Training certificate and are thus well qualified to instruct their pupils in the subject. At the Summer School for teachers held in Prince Edward Island teachers were successful in obtaining their "B" certificates and the \$15 bonus.
