considerable. "Infirmary: There are 128 female and 78 male patients and, like Falconwood, there is much overcrowding. The kitchen and equipment is not large enough for their requirements, and we recommend that extra equipment be purchased for the laundry. Much commendation is due Mrs. Gask and her staff for the excellent condition in which the infirmary is kept."

The Grand Jury, after inspecting the Queen's County Jail, Falconwood Hospital, the Infirmary and annex at Beach Grove Inn reported as follows: "We found the jail, under the management of Mr. Burr Dwyer, to be in good order and well cared for, with twenty-six male prisoners and six female inmates."

"The Provincial Infirmary and the Male Dispensary at Falconwood Hospital, are buildings with inadequate fire protection. Both these buildings are wooden construction, inside, and outside, a serious fire hazard, and though equipped with fire escapes, standpipes and hose, they are still inadequately protected."

"The sprinkler system would be of little help in retarding any fire in the infirmary, and we believe that the patients would have some chance of being saved. Therefore we ask that the matter be given very serious consideration, so that the men have the maximum protection available under the present circumstances."

"Further, we might state that the building at Falconwood which contains the storeroom, which contains a maximum of butter, cold storage plant, milk unit and carpenter shop, offers a serious fire hazard, and in case of fire the loss suffered by destruction of equipment and stores would be considerable."

(Continued from Page 1) It again at his chest, and fired a second, fatal bullet. He toppled face down on the floor.

The shooting was the second mass killing in Ontario within three days. Last Saturday night in Sudbury, Clarence Brousseau, 43, went berserk, killed three persons, wounded five and committed suicide.

Today's shooting abruptly ended the hearing of a non-support charge brought against the former Sudbury Ont. Provincial Police officer. Recently, Gray has been a taxi-driver and part-time movie theatre ticket taker.

Mrs. Gray, 40, separated from her husband for two years and mother of three children, was killed almost instantly as Gray pulled the trigger of the revolver he had taken from his pocket.

As she slumped to the floor, Judge McKittrick, at 45 one of Canada's youngest magistrates, attempted to duck behind his desk. He was too late. He died in hospital less than an hour later, a few minutes before the death in the same hospital of the other woman.

Rev. G. Morgan, superintendent of the Royal Arthur Sellers Institute, disclosed later that Gray had been bitter about his non-support suit and a few days ago had said: "Some day I intend to get the judge."

F.H. (Bully) Davis, Gray's counsel, present with three other persons at the time of the shooting, gave a graphic account of the tragedy, unprejudiced in a Canadian court.

"The charge was laid and Gray pleaded not guilty. Mrs. Gray then gave brief testimony. . . . Gray . . . pulled a gun from his pocket, he was sitting near his wife. He swung the weapon towards her and pulled the trigger. "Then, in a flash, he pointed the gun at Judge McKittrick, who attempted to duck behind his table."

"Gray, his eyes glazed, pointed the gun straight at me. Apparently however, he recognized me . . . anyway, he turned away and with heat said: 'Get the hell out of here.'" At that stage, Davis said, "I took the hint and rushed to the police station to report the affair."

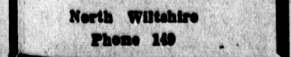
