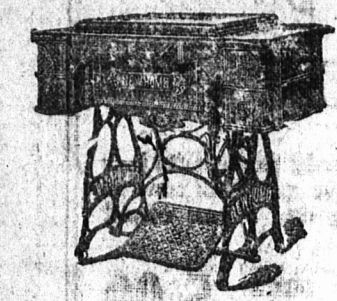

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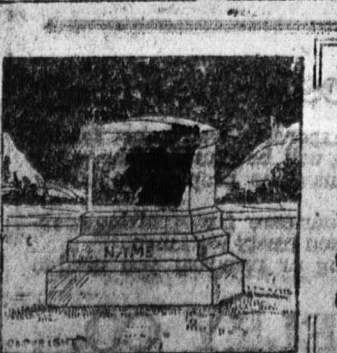

THE SENLAC REBUILT—The steamer Senlac which formerly traded between P. E. Island and Newfoundland and which was burnt to the waterline at Sydney some time ago, has been bought by Chas. Briston and Son. The Senlac will be towed to Halifax by the tug Bridgewater and converted into a trading steamer.

ARTILLERY REINFORCEMENTS—Major Leigh has received instructions to raise a draft of Artillery reinforcements consisting of one lieutenant and fifty rank and file. Recruiting will commence immediately, and a depot will be opened at the drill shed for this purpose. The qualification for this draft are: height 5 ft. 4 ins., chest 32 inches age eighteen to forty-five married or single.

SUNKEN MONTMAGNY SOLD—The well known Canadian government steamer Montmagny, which has been beneath the waters of the St. Lawrence, near the Island of Orleans, for almost a year, has been sold by public tender to the St. Charles Navigation Company of Quebec for \$25,000. The vessel originally cost over \$100,000. A contract was some time ago given to a company to raise the Montmagny, but they were unsuccessful. The Montmagny was sunk after having been in collision with the collier L'Ingenieur September 18th, 1914. Fourteen lives were lost.

(Continued from page three.) MAYOR P. S. BROWN, moved by Mr. P. W. McLeod, seconded by Mr. William Holland. MR. A. A. McLEAN, M. P., moved by Mr. E. Howatt, seconded by Mr. John Diamond. MR. D. NICHOLSON, M. P., moved by Mr. Thomas Wigmore, seconded by Mr. Adam Criswell. All the nominations were made unanimous. It was found that 305 ballots were cast out of a possible of 320. After an interval during which the ballots were being counted, the following results were announced: Nicholson 195 votes McLeod 174 votes Martin 125 votes Brown 111 votes The result of the voting was received with great applause, hearty cheering being indulged in. Messrs. Brown and Martin thanked the electors for their presence at the meeting and the support which they received, and Messrs. McLean and Nicholson in brief and to-the-point addresses warmly thanked the gentlemen for the evidence of their trust in them both declared their intention of trying to do all within their power for the future welfare of Prince Edward Island. On motion of Mayor Brown, seconded by Mr. Martin, the nomination of Messrs. Nicholson and McLean was declared unanimous and after cheers for the candidates the meeting adjourned.

PETROGRAD, AUG. 24.—Further advances by Russians at West Lake Van in southern Turkish Armenia are reported in an official statement which follows:— Our offensive west of Lake Van is developing. Northeast of the town of Mush we occupied the region of the village of Arindovank. In the direction of Moani our gallant troops defeated four Turkish divisions in the region of the village of Bachlau. Two regiments were surrounded and taken prisoners, one of these regiments surrendered in a body with its commander and staff, cannon and machine guns were captured. Counting of booty and prisoners taken is proceeding.
