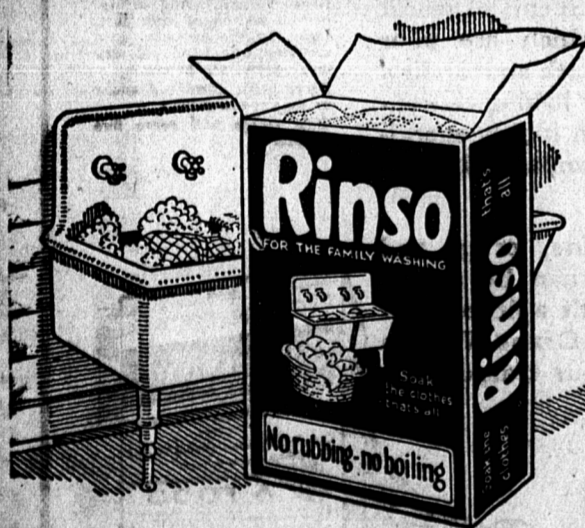

IN MEMORIAM

MR. FRANCIS GREENAN

At Newton on July 4th, inst., after a lingering illness of Diabetes, which he bore with great patience, resignation and a strong hope and faith in the future, there passed to its eternal reward the soul of Francis Greenan.

He was constantly attended during his long illness by his pastor Rev. Father Smith of Kinkora, who administered to him these sacraments and all the consolations of the Holy Catholic Church.

He was born in Newton 78 years ago and as there was no District School there in his boyhood days, it was by great efforts and self study that he fitted himself for a school teacher, and taught successfully in his native District for seven years; after which he did a commission business at Emerald Junction for some years; he then studied telegraphy and was appointed Agent at Fredtown in 1879 where he remained for some years, going from there to Carleton, St. Peter's, Bradabane and North Wiltshire, respectively, from which station he resigned in June 1896. Since which time he has lived on the homestead in Newton. He was a life-long student and had great natural talents, but of a modest and retiring disposition; having many fine friends and no enemies. His funeral services took place at Kinkora on July 8th, the bearers were Michael Mulligan, P. J. Smith, Patrick Carr, Patrick Mulligan, Francis Carr and Thos. McCabe.

A requiem High Mass was celebrated by Rev. Father C.H. Trainor of Fall River, Mass., who also performed the last services at the grave, R. I. P.

LARGE NUMBER PAY LAST RESPECTS TO MADDIN

GLACE BAY, July 14.—What was undoubtedly one of the largest funerals ever held in this town took place here yesterday afternoon when the remains of the late Maddin MacRae, who met death by drowning in the Mira River on Friday afternoon last, were laid to rest in St. Ann's Cemetery. Long before the funeral hour hundreds visited the home of the deceased to pay their last respects

to one who was so much loved among them. People from all walks of life and from all parts of the island were in attendance at the funeral and many a tear was shed as the funeral procession wended its way to St. Ann's cemetery. After leaving the house the funeral cortege proceeded to St. Ann's Church where service was conducted by the Rev. Father McMullin assisted by the St. Ann's choir. At the graveside the Rev. Father Leo Keats officiated. The funeral procession was nearly a mile in length, there been in the vicinity of 125 cars in the procession.

Through the columns of the Post Mr. and Mrs. MacRae parents of the deceased boy wish to warmly thank Father McKenna, Mrs. Dr. Chisholm, Miss Dora Burke and all the good people of Mira Ferry who assisted in helping find the body also Dr. John McDonald of Sydney for his kind assistance rendered. They also wish to thank Larry Shathan and members of the Glace Bay Police force in the preparations they made in grappling for the body, also Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Manson of Sydney, Dr. and Mrs. D. M. Gillies of Glace Bay and the Jewish public of Glace Bay as well as Dr. F. W. Green for the medical attention given. They also wish to thank the general public for the fine manner in which they turned out to attend the funeral and the kind words of sympathy given.

The pall bearers all friends of the deceased were Bernice Currie, Russell Cummings, Vincent Platon, Edward Martin, Tom Sullivan and Joseph Sullivan. About thirty students, all classmates of the deceased at college, marched ahead of the hearse, wearing a white ribbon of mourning. Telegrams of sympathy were received from Mr. and Mrs. Neil R.
