Fielding, it was learned tonight, has passed along the suggestion of Premier Dunning to Sir Frederick Williams-Taylor, head of the Canadian Bankers' Association, asking that the bankers' most representative of the Western Provinces and try to arrange methods of financing the 1922 crop.

Police Are Called To Church Meeting

TORONTO, Aug. 22.—Because of the alleged over-boisterous nature of the religious services held at the Free Methodist Church, at 107 Eglinton Avenue, complaint was lodged by some neighboring residents with No. 12 Police Station, North Toronto. They charged that the meeting on Sunday evening was noisy and the conduct of the congregation unbecomingly. On Police Constables Holie and Ablett being sent to investigate, they reported that they found a crowd outside the church looking in and they heard considerable noise. The congregation of men and women was kneeling. Some of the women were prostrated upon the floor. A number of the congregation burst into shrieks of ecstasy, some of the members being so affected with emotion that they swooned and others rose and danced.

Police Are Called To Church Meeting

The pastor, Rev. G. H. Bray on being spoken to by the police, told the constables that the actions of the congregation were but a manifestation of the spirit which was present at the meeting, and in accordance with the creed in which the Free Methodists believed. He emphatically denied the allegations that there was dancing or that the men came up and kissed him. Two members, in their joy over difficulties in church work being overcome, had, in congratulating him, embraced him by putting their arms around him.
