## McKINNON-BRUCE TRIAL.

### Judge Hodgson Gives His Decision—Seat Goes to McKinnon.

Mr. Justice Hodgson gave judgement at Georgetown yesterday morning in the McKinnon-Bruce election trial and declared McKinnon entitled to the seat. He congratulated the parties and all connected with the trial upon the termination of the long pending enquiry. He stated that all election enquiries under the local statutes outside of the question of disqualification and enquiries relating to corrupt practices were simply a scrutiny of the votes polled. Three classes of votes could be struck off: (1) The votes of those who had not the required property qualification. (2) Those who had voted in the wrong polling division, and (3) Those who had been guilty of corrupt practices, such as "treating." These last had not only their votes struck off but they were disqualified from voting for eight years, and during that time were unable to hold any office under the crown, unless they came within Sub. Sec. 2 of Sec. 115 of 51 Vic. Cap. 1, when it appeared that there had been no corrupt intention and that they had been guilty of a technical breach of the law only.

In his His Lordship's opinion the Legislature intended absolutely to prohibit the giving of liquor to electors on the polling day. There were three classes of cases with which he had to deal. The first resembled that of Oswald Campbell. He and two other electors bought a bottle of whiskey and drank it themselves. This drinking (the selling was of course a violation of the C.T. Act) was not contrary to any law.

The second class, like Davy, who after the poll closed bought a bottle of whiskey (also in violation of the C. T. Act) and on his way home took two men into his sleigh and treated them. Davy would lose his vote but it was impossible to say that such an act did influence or was intended to influence the electors so that there would be no disqualification.

The third class resembled that of Carney McLure to whose possession several cases of whiskey procured in Charlottetown were traced and who not only treated electors on election day but

gave three bottles to an elector to treat people at the polls, which he unquestionably did.

The Sheriff on Declaration Day had allowed Bruce 335 votes and McKinnon 333 votes and declared Bruce elected by a majority of two.

Mr. Justice Hodgson disallowed on the scrutiny the votes of James W. Livingstone, Donald B. McPherson, James Hume and W. P. Burke, which were cast for Bruce upon the ground that they had no qualification, and directed their votes to be struck off the poll-books.

The Judge struck off the votes of the following persons who voted for Bruce, upon the ground that they had treated other electors on the polling day, viz: Malcolm McLeod, Milltown; John Leman, Montague Bridge; John Singleton, Peter's Road; Lauchlin McFadyen, Peter's Road; Allan McDonald, Valleyfield; Charles Barnes, Murray River; Benjamin Davy, Commercial Cross; Joseph Kennedy, Montague Bridge; Murdoch N. Nicholson, Commercial Cross and Daniel McLean, Milltown. Inasmuch as these parties were only guilty of a technical breach of the law, their cases came within the saving clauses of the law and would only lose their votes and would not be reported for disqualification.

The Judge struck off the votes of the following electors who voted for Bruce and whom he found guilty of corrupt practices, viz: Donald McDonald, Caledonia; William McLean, Glen Martin George Connors, Albion; William Leman, Montague Bridge; Norman McDonald, Commercial Cross; Carney McLure; Murray River; Gavin McLeod, Murray River; and in addition they would be reported for disqualification from voting and holding office for the next eight years.

The Judge disallowed the vote of Howard Buchanan, cast for Bruce, who voted in the wrong polling district.

In the result the Court found that McKinnon had 333 votes and Bruce 312 and declared that McKinnon was entitled to the seat. The Respondent Bruce was ordered to pay the costs of suit.

## GOVERNMENT STOCK FARM.

### A Talk With Mr. McMillan About the Year's Work and the Yield

The past season, although a dry one being far below the average in quantity of rain fall, has resulted in most respects in bringing forth a bountiful harvest. With one or two exceptions the different crops grown on the provincial farm have yielded a good average return and in some cases, notably in the case of the corn crop excellent results have been obtained. The acreage under hay was large, there being upwards of 100 acres under that crop. The yield of first crop was good, much of the older meadow land was fair, while in one or two sections the return was somewhat light. On the whole a large quantity of hay was stored in excellent condition and will furnish in conjunction with corn ensilage an abundance of coarse fodder for the winter months.

The area devoted to grain crops was not large, some 27 acres of oats were harvested. The yield of straw was light and as the crop has not yet been threshed no sure predictions can be made concerning the return in grain.

The barley crop was good and gives promise of an excellent yield. Two varieties were grown, the common two rowed and the six rowed handscheuri. It will be interesting to compare results when the crop is threshed.

The pea crop although not yet threshed promises well. Only a small portion, about 2 1/2 acres was sown this year. The results are encouraging, however, and a much larger quantity will be grown next season. The corn crop is excellent, the yield being from 15 to 17 tons per acre by actual weight. The season from the first was favorable and the crop although not plant-

ed as early as it might have been came on rapidly from the start. A field of fourteen acres was sown on May 31st and on June 1st. The weeder was set at work shortly after the plants came up and later the cultivator was used at frequent intervals until the plants become too far advanced to permit of the passage of the machine. On September 29th cutting and placing of the corn in the silo was begun. A light frost on the night of Sept 25th cut down a few of the upper leaves, but otherwise did no material damage. From that time until October 13th, when the corn harvest was completed no more frosts occurred and the weather being fine the crop was gathered in excellent condition. The plants bore a large percentage of ears which were beginning to glaze. The silo capacity is almost all taken up, and in this store it may with full assurance be expected has a very valuable adjunct in the fall and winter feeding. During the coming winter cattle foods will be high and fortunate is the farmer who has a well filled silo to supplement the hay mow and grain bin in the feeding of his stock.

The crop of green fodder on the farm comprising 4 or 5 acres, was fed off during the summer months. The root crop comprising 6 1/2 acres and consisting of mangels, carrots, and turnips is a fair one. The yield will not be large as the roots are lacking in size. The dryness of the season has no doubt checked the growth considerably. Preparations have been made for a larger crop next year, the intention being to place a greater area of the Farm under cultivated crops each season and thus to introduce a shorter rotation.

It is stated in C. P. R. circles, says the Winnipeg Telegram that the fine steamer Yarmouth, running between Charlottetown and Boston, will be purchased by the company to replace the lost steamer Islander. Should the purchase of the Yarmouth be included she will be at once taken round the Horn to the Pacific coast during the winter. Captain Troup, manager of the C. P. R. coast steamship service, who has been in the east effecting the purchasing of new steamers for the coast service, is expected to arrive in Winnipeg shortly.
