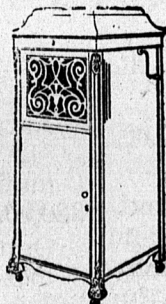

225,000 CORDS.—Mr. John Al-fred McDonald, surveyor, who in his survey work over the Island has good opportunities for observing and esti-mating, figures that the annual con-sumption of wood (hard and soft) for fuel is 225,000 cords. At \$4 a cord his amounts to \$1,000,000 annual cash value.

Some of the energetic farm-ers are making great improvements in their barns and other buildings, putting in cement stables, etc. —Mr. Fred A. Pigott has just about comple-ted his new house, which is one of the most up-to-date in its vicinity. —Some of Savage Harbor's most skilled marksmen, have been set out for wild geese recently. It is said that they got quite a lot. The wild geese have not frequented Savage Bay for quite a number of years until this fall. It is to be hoped that they have come back to stay.

Mr. Neill McPhee, Big Pond, loaded a car at Harmony Jct. Allan Hillis, Hay River, doaded a car which he shipped. Chester McDonald, Clear Springs, shipped a car load to Pratt & son, a week or so ago and loaded another car Saturday last. Mr. Angus McKinnon, Naufrage, loaded him-self, a car of potatoes at Selkirk station. This is individual effort with co-operation, all might have this ad-vantage.

Messrs D. J. McLeod and Frank Jenkins were in the city last night on return to Boston after occupying the remains of the latter's wife, sister of the former to Annandale for interment. They arrived in Charlottetown on their sad mission Saturday, Oct. 5th and as no train was available procured a motor-truck and had the remains taken that night to Dundas. Interment was made on the following Monday, October 27th at Annandale.

SUGAR PLENTIFUL IN NEW ORLEANS.

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 10.—Sugar was plentiful in all the stores yester-day at 12 to 18 cents a pound, the sup-ply coming from the 500 barrels bor-owed daily from the local stock of the British Royal Commission. Seven car-loads of sugar arrived from the cargo of the steamer Santurce, which un-loaded its cargo of Havana crude at Mobile. This sugar will be refined at once and put on the market.

One hundred sugar planters and producers met in executive and secret session in the St. Charles Hotel here yesterday to consider what shall be done towards the fixing of the price of this year's crop and the marketing of their product, since the government definitely refused to take it off their hands.

In spite of Attorney-General Pal-mer's warning that sales at any price above 15 cents would be considered profiteering, and prosecuted, the majority of the planters are holding out for 17 cents, and it is believed this is the price that eventually will be agreed on, though nothing will be given out officially as to the result of the meeting until today and possibly not until Monday. The meeting now being held is one of the most im-portant ever held by Louisiana sugar men. John P. Rogers, Washington representative of the planters, came here especially to tell this meeting the situation in Washington, and Henry Mooney, United States District Attorney, will explain the govern-ment's attitude as outlined to him by Mr. Palmer.

At the same time, the government's agents are continuing their investiga-tion of the stocks of sugar held here, and the Department of Justice re-ported that seven of the largest gro-cers in the city are under special in-vestigation on suspicion of profiteer-ing in sugar.

SADOU TO FACE THE FIRING SQUAD

PARIS, Nov. 8.—Capt. Jacques Sadoul was condemned to death today by a unanimous vote of the court martial convened to try him for in-telligence with the enemy. The charge was based upon his relations with the Russian Bolsheviks. He was not present at the trial, being still in Russia.

Belgrade, November 10.—(By The A. P.)—There has been a clash between forces of the Italian govern-ment and Gabriele D'Annunzio's troops in which casualties were suf-fered by both sides, according to a statement issued by the Serbian of-ficial press bureau today. The state-ment follows:

In a sanguinary skirmish between Italian government troops and Gab-rielle D'Annunzio's forces, the gov-ernment troops suffered considerable losses, including one captain. D'An-nunzio's troops lost one man killed and several wounded.

A telegram received from Tagrol, says there is much dissatisfaction among D'Annunzio's soldiers because of scant food and that there is little military discipline.

SOLDIERS ATTACK AUSTRALIAN PREMIER
