It contained among other things the announcement that His Holiness the Pope had extended the Holy Year for the faithful outside of Rome, all during 1926 accompanied by the regular indulgences. The Lenten Regulations as read were the same as last year.

WOUNDED BY BANDIT. Summerside friends of Mr. Asher B. Burrows, brother of Misses Cella and Constance Burrows of this town, will regret to learn that he is in hospital in Kansas City, under treatment for a bullet wound received at the hands of a bandit whose object was robbery. The Kansas City Times of February 8th gives the following particulars of the affair: A "shooting bandit" held up the Brown Owl Coffee Shop, 3503 Troost avenue, last night, wounded Asher B. Burrows, 3524 Troost avenue and escaped with \$450 from the cash till. The bandit entered the place about 8.30 o'clock while Mrs. Minnie A. Bostell, owner, was checking up the day's receipts. Burrows was standing near the cash drawer. While the bandit was scooping up the money, the cash till fell to the floor. Burrows reached to pick it up and the bandit fired twice. One of the bullets struck Burrows in the left leg, inflicting a flesh wound. The second bullet glanced from the floor, striking Miss Catherine Edwards in the right leg. Its only damage was to tear a hole in the young woman's stocking. Miss Marjorie Belle, 3319 Wayne avenue, and H. C. Russell, Amidor hotel, customers, said the robber paid no attention to them.

FORMER ISLAND PRIEST. Rev. J. C. MacKenzie, P. P. Revelstoke, B. C., has been appointed pastor of St. John's, succeeding the late Father Althoff, says the Antigonish Casket. Before ordination he helped a great deal to put St. Louis College, New Westminster, on a high school basis, and his was the first ordination in Vancouver. He was elevated to the priesthood in September, 1911. Father MacKenzie is a native of Yverdon, P. E. I. His studies were made at St. Dunstan's, at Rochester Seminary, and at Denver. Father "Joe" was succeeded at Revelstoke by his brother Father Wilbert MacKenzie.
