ENGLISH STAKE RACE WON BY OUTSIDER

French Lost To Cubs For Two Months As Cincinnati Wins First Game Of Season

NEW YORK, April 28—(AP)—Van Lingle Mungo and Brooklyn Dodgers evened matters with their arch-rivals, the Giants, today by coming through with a 3-2 victory here while limiting the National League champions to three hits. The victory was a double triumph for Mungo. The fireball righthander outpitched Hal Schumacher, who bested him in a hurling duel on the season's opening day.

Brooklyn's infield barely held together to give Mungo his first victory in three starts. Sporting a 8-1 lead in the ninth, the Dodgers weakened and allowed a Giant run to cross on a walk. Woody English's error and a forceout at second.

Phils Halt Bees
The Phillies playing at home, won their fourth game in six starts, piling up an early lead to defeat Boston Bees 7-4.

Danny McFayden, who held the Phillies to four hits in losing a 1-0 game at Boston opening day, was knocked out of the box in the first inning.

Browne led off with a single. Johnny Moore hit a homer over the right field fence. Klein singled but Arnohich hit into a double play. Six straight hits scored four more runs however and brought in Bill Feyer, a southpaw, in place of McFayden.

Costly Loss for Cubs
In Chicago Cincinnati Reds won their first game of the season, a 10-3 decision over Chicago which also cost the Cubs the services of their ace lefthander, Larry French for two months.

A blazing line drive from the bat of Ernie Lombardi, struck French on the right hand in the first inning, breaking three fingers. The Reds sewed up the game in the hectic first inning, rushing over six runs. Weintraub contributed a homer and a single to a 14-hit assault on French, Root and Clay Bryant.

AMERICAN LEAGUE
Game in Fine Form
NEW YORK, April 28—(AP)—Behind Lefty Gomez's five-hit pitching, the champion New York Yankees won their fourth straight game today, clobbering the Senators 6-1 in Washington to retain their grip on first place in the American Baseball League.

The Senators lost the services of their varsity shortstop, Cecil Travis, who wrenched his knee sliding into third in the seventh inning.

The Yanks collected seven singles from the offerings of Joe Cascarella and two other pitchers, and were never headed after taking a two-run edge in the second.

Mel Harder held Chicago White Sox to five hits and Earl Averill hit a home run with the bases full as the Indians defeated Chicago 7-2 in Cleveland.

Harder held the White Sox to two hits until the ninth when both Rosenthal and Bonura doubled and Appling singled to score the two runs which kept Harder from a shutout victory.

French Colt, 20 To 1 Shot, Captures Two Thousand Guineas By Four Lengths

NEWMARKET, Suffolk, April 28—(CP Cable)—A new favorite for the Epsom Derby, the French colt Le Ksar, emerged tonight from the 129th running of the historic Two Thousand Guineas, first of the season's classic stake events for three-year-olds.

Made Favorite for Derby

Bookmakers did a big business after the race in bets backing Le Ksar to win the Derby and carry the turf's blue riband across the English Channel for the first time since Durbar II won by three lengths in 1914. It was anticipated the colt would be made a strong favorite when underwriters next meet at the Victoria Club to call over the cards.

Outclasses Field

Le Ksar, an outsider at 20 to 1, easily outclassed the field of 18, taking the lead a couple of furlongs from the winning post after running well to the rear throughout the first half mile. Once in front, the French colt threw off a challenge from Marcel Boussac's Goya II and crossed the line in a matter of four lengths in front. Goya II held off Mrs. G. B. Miller's Mid-Day Sun to take second place by half a length.

Favorites Far Back

The post-time favorite, W. Murray's Fairford, hitherto highly regarded for the derby, ran a disappointing race and finished seventh, while the second favorite, Marshall Field's Foray, failed to stay the distance and came in fifth.
