"Idol of France" Now Partner in Russian Gambling Compact

PARIS, Nov. 7.—Henry Letellier and Georges Carpentier are en route to Moscow to negotiate a gambling concession in Russia with the Soviets. The couple are due in Riga, where they expect permits to proceed, as M. Letellier already has been corresponding with the Bolsheviks concerning a concession which provides for using the czar's palaces as gambling halls. Only gold rubles and English and French money will be accepted in the gambling, paper rubles being barred.

M. Letellier, publisher of *The Journal*, owns a string of race horses. He is a shareholder of Cannes, Deauville, and Biarritz gambling casinos. Last year he visited Prague and almost completed a gambling concession in Czechoslovakia. Marienbad and Karlsbad, but popular outcry caused the Government to cancel it.

"Regardless of the worthless currency, gold, precious stones and metals are still plentiful in Russia," said M. Letellier and the Soviets can split \$20,000,000 annually on the deal," said a friend of the publisher here.

business men in addition to the regular poultry show, educational talks, moving pictures, etc., are going to "invite" themselves during the winter season to suitable farm houses, providing their own refreshments, etc., and meet the farmers for the discussion of ways and means of closer cooperation.

"I feel sure that if a partnership could be entered into here between city and country we could keep at least a normal amount of money within the province for developing the province," the speaker declared. "It should be Charlottetown for P.E. Island and P.E. Island for Charlottetown."

Mr. Benson concluded with expressing his pleasure at again visiting the province, where he and Mrs. Benson had made many warm friendships.

His Honor Lieut. Governor MacKinnon paid an enthusiastic tribute to the work accomplished by Mr. Benson while in this province and expressed his pleasure of hearing an address so timely and helpful. Ex-Kaiser Has Exposed Himself

LONDON, Nov. 7.—The Daily Chronicle, reviewing the ex-Kaiser's book, "My Memoirs 1878-1918," published here by Cassells, says:

"Wilhelm, has written a book and has given himself away. At least this could well have been said of him, that as imperial head of state, he did, to use a theatrical expression, fill the bill. He looked the part and acted—even over-acted the part. The imperial purple, the glittering armor, the feudalistic of his imperial patter, if one may be forgiven the term, and the posture, were all part of a consistent and impressive character piece.

"The Kaiser of the memoirs is a very different being. He is a meek patient, altogether misunderstood, much wronged, yet long suffering and almost saintly figure. All the swank has disappeared. We can hardly identify him with the sub-rattling monarch, that agitated the whole people for forty years with his speeches and action. The new role, it must be confessed, does not suit him. It is, as it were, the king of Grimm's fairy tale without his clothes, and what a puny thing this naked figure of fallen grandeur reveals itself to be. Most astonishing of all is his utterly imbecile credulity.

"As an exponent of his credulity, the Chronicle points out the ex-Kaiser's acceptance of the alleged secret treaty between the United States, Britain and France made in 1897, whereby it was agreed they would range themselves against Germany in the event of war.

"This yarn is as precious a piece of nonsense as was ever invented," says the Chronicle. "The ex-Kaiser accepts it as gospel truth; here at last is proof; who dare speak of Germany's war guilt?"

The Chronicle concludes: "To non-Germans this straw autobiography has a pathological, even a pathetic interest. To his readers the ex-Kaiser reveals himself as a Simon Tappertit, a vain silly posterer atomy of a man. To himself he is sublimely the greatest of the Hohenzollerns, omniscient, prophetic, a superman, the chosen instrument of Divine Will."

Surgical Apparatus

Featured at London

(Special To The Guardian.)

LONDON Nov. 7.—At the twelfth London medical exhibition opened at the Central Hall, Westminster were shown means by which almost all the ills that flesh is heir to may be cured.

Were it not that the wonderful instruments to be seen are invented for the purpose of bringing happiness to mankind, the place might be described as a chamber of horrors.

The general public were not admitted, but the rooms were crowded with doctors enthusing over the great scientific developments exposed to their view.

The public will be interested in the demonstrations which are being made on the bacillus botulinus, which figured so prominently in the recent Lock Mares poisoning case. A weakly baby can be made into a modern Hercules by treatment in an electrical incubator. Surgical appliances have developed to such a degree of perfection that the body is now an open book to the surgeon.

"There is practically no part of the body but can be inspected by optical instruments," a press representative was told at one of the stands, where there was exhibited a wonderful operating table. The patent can be operated upon in any position without removing the patient from the table and, if he cared to," said the informant facetiously, "the surgeon could then use the table as a barber's chair."
