CONKLIN FOX FARMS WILL BE SUBDIVIDED

TORONTO, Dec. 21.—The sale of the famous Conklin Fox Farms, which are situated on the eastern side of the Credit river, adjacent to and overlooking the fairways of the Mississauga golf course, for \$14,000 to Wrights Limited, real estate developers, 22 College street, is announced this morning.

The area, one of the most beautiful in the environs of Toronto, will be subdivided into large parcels and will be sold as a summer residential area.

It is the purpose of the purchasers of the property to give the members of the Mississauga Golf Club a first opportunity to locate in this unique area.

The Conklin Fox Farms will be relocated in the golf course area, whether Mr. Conklin has already removed his home from Port Credit, but in the process of removal a part of their former property will be still occupied by them to facilitate the housing of the valuable animals which cannot be removed immediately.

The Conklin Fox Farms purchased this site from the Peel Manufacturing Company, former owners of the whole of the town of Port Credit, who were originally granted 114 acres by the crown.

MONTREAL, Que., Dec. 21.—There was some enquiry from foreign buyers for grain on the Montreal market today, but as the price of wheat was in most cases below working basis little business of importance was done and the market generally was quiet. The trade cash in the domestic market was also slow but no recent advance in prices noted.

There was strength in the cash wheat situation at Winnipeg. A stronger feeling developed in the local market for spring wheat grades of flour and prices were advanced ten cents per barrel. Car lots of ursta patents were quoted at \$8.00, second patents at \$5.50 and strong bakers at \$7.50 per barrel. The un-graded to the winter wheat flour market was steady and a moderate amount of business was done. The mill feed market continued active and prices were firm. DISASTROUS FIRE

Queen Street Buildings Completely Guttled—Loss a Heavy One.

At 3.30 yesterday morning the city firemen were called out to fight one of the most destructive, stubborn and disastrous fires which has occurred in this city for a long time.

Practically the whole block between Dorchester and King streets facing on Queen Street an occupied by Dillon & Spillet, B. Conrad & Co., C. F. Fisher, Alex. MacPherson, Mrs. Mary Jane MacMillan, Mrs. Morgan, Mr. Philip McQuaid, Mr. Wm. Bevan, and Murley & Coombs was gutted.

The alarm was sent in by Mr. Alex. MacPherson who was awakened by the smoke and when the fire had gained considerably headway and Dillon & Spillet's on the corner and B. Conrad & Co., adjoining was a seething mass of flames. Despite the utmost efforts of the firemen who attacked the burning mass with about a dozen streams of water, the entire structure was consumed.

Adjoining buildings were in constant danger but the quick and efficient work of the fire fighters saved the buildings.

The cause of the fire is not known. But it must have been caused by the back of the building for some time as officers Watson Higgins and Allan McInnis passed the premises about twenty minutes before the alarm was rung and at that time no signs of fire were apparent.

The firemen were kindly treated to hot coffee and lunch by Mr. J. B. Flemming when opportunity afforded them time to partake of such generosity.

The loss is difficult to estimate. Mr. S. J. Lett's loss is around \$5,000, covered by insurance but he also had \$15,000 worth of silver fox pelts in the building.

Conrad & Co. lost 250-300 live fowl and 350 boxes of dressed poultry.

The building was owned by themselves and the Lanz estate and was valued at over \$200,000. The insurance value of the receipts including poultry, eggs, small quantities of potatoes, the un-graded to the market continued and y but prices showed no further change. Car lots of Prince Edward Island green mountains were quoted at \$1.70 to \$1.75 per bag of 90 out of the upper stories of the building. Mr. Dillon and Spillet buildings, Mr. Coombs estimates his loss between mountains at \$155 per bag and Quebec white stock at \$1.40 per 100. The tone of the market for beans was firm under a steady demand, sales of car lots of choice white hand picked were made at \$2.75 per bushel and smaller quantities at \$3.00 per bushel. The demand for butter continued good and a moderate amount of business was done. No. 1 pasteurized was quoted at 41 1/2 cents to 40 1/2 cents per pound. The receipts were heavy. Extreme dullness marked the local and export trade in cheese but prices were steady. Western grades were quoted at 18 1/2 cents to 18 cents per pound. The receipts were 237 boxes.

OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 21.—Canadian egg markets are unchanged. Toronto—Dealers are paying for ungraded extras 60, firsts 61, firsts 51 to 53, seconds 53, justor, is yet unable to state definitely the amount of insurance on tailers of fresh extra 70 to 75, all the property destroyed, as there will be from fourteen to fifteen to deal with.

HOUSEWORK FOR NERVES

LONDON, Dec. 21.—Take a hammer and drive nails of scrubbing brush and clean up the floor, or any of the other thousand and one duties about a house and the matter of "nerves" will become something of the past, was the advice handed out by Dame Mary Scharlieb to a crowded house of women at the Institute of Hygiene.

Household work is one of the greatest curses that women may take for "nerves," continued Dr. Scharlieb who is dean of the British medical women and has been practising her more than fifty years. "Nervous girls and women want to get the greatest advantage from work; work of any kind. The woman who stays at home is able to occupy herself in a variety of do-able, mental tasks which are beneficial to mind and body alike."

TESTS SLEEPING BRAIN FOR ABILITY TO LEARN

MINNEAPOLIS, Dec. 21.—A University of Minnesota psychologist is seeking to determine whether or not learning can be acquired in sleep.

Prof. W. T. Heron is conducting the experiment on himself. He has rigged up a telephone with an electrically driven phonograph so that sounds are conveyed to his ears by headphones. The contrivance is so arranged that when he releases his grip on an automatic switch, as he falls asleep, the phonograph starts operating softly.

"Whenever I awaken, the renewal of the grip on the switch will immediately stop the machine," he said. "In this way I will be sure that I will not hear the material in the waking state.

"It does not seem to be beyond the realm of possibility that the human being may learn, at least to some extent, while asleep."
