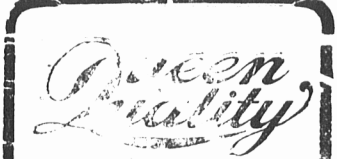

At the Police Court yesterday Harry Melvin, a waiter on board the steamer Halifax, was sentenced to six weeks imprisonment for assault on Capt Ellis while off Point Prim on Thursday night. Melvin was walking on deck with a lady contrary to orders. He was ordered below by the captain who afterwards caught him by the collar and dragged him towards the stairway. At the door he hit the captain on the eye. James Power did not appear on a summons but was fined \$10 or 60 days for using abusive language and \$5 or 30 days for cornering. Peter McAleer for disturbing religious worship at the Cathedral was given \$10 or 1 month.

A copy received of the Earlham Echo, Iowa, contains an account of the display of Easter, cattle here which was clipped from The Guardian and in comparison says: "Now this may be pretty good stock raising in Prince Edward Island but an Iowa stock feeder would be ashamed to claim ownership of a bunch of cattle of same age and weight at finishing period. W. J. Eisele is feeding a bunch of thirty-six two-year old steers which average 1,300 pounds each. P. P. Schlarb recently sold forty two-year old steers which averaged 1,100 pounds each while Chas. Jackson sold a bunch of eighteen months old steers last fall in Chicago which topped the market. They weighed nearly 1,200 each. These are only a few of the many similar results we could give. Come out to Iowa boys and we'll show you how to raise cattle."

MONTREAL, June 15.—Forty or fifty granite cutters who went out on strike on April 14 for higher wages, shorter hours and union shop returned to work to-day under old terms.

THE market was well supplied yesterday, and prices varied slightly from Tuesday's market. Eggs still bring 14cts per doz; butter is quoted from 19 to 22 cts per lb; hay, 65 to 70 cts per cwt; and oats 36 to 38 cts. Potatoes, wholesale, are selling at 82 cts per bus.

A FIELD of hay which is pronounced by many as the best to be seen on the island at the present time is owned by Charles Rodd of this city and located at North River Corner about 4 1/2 miles from the city. The hay is of uniform height and the stalks average over two feet. Fertilizer did the work.

ON Wednesday, 15th, at Georgetown, Prosecutor Bears obtained a conviction against William White of Toronto for violation of the C. T. Act. White was fined \$50 and costs for two months. Several cases were dismissed for several reasons. The Stipendiary warned druggists that the prescriptions now used would not in future be recognised unless made in the proper form. Several waitresses were fined \$2 or 15 days each for not having appeared on subpoenas. This should be a warning to others.

FISH stories of every sort are on the rounds about this time every year, but a Guardian representative was told a story last evening of an unusual nature. Two of our suburban residents drove to Thompson's mills to spend the day catching the "speckled beauties" and they were well rewarded for in a short time they caught eight very choice trout. At this juncture it may be said that their expectations were far exceeded when something heavy on the line told the sportsman that it was the time to act, so bracing his feet he started pulling on the line and finally succeeded in landing what he thought was the largest trout yet on record, but was not a little surprised to find that it was an eel. To get it off the hook was the next problem to be solved, but finally he thought of the right plan, and left it minus its head, the fisherman solemnly declaring that it tried to get back to the water. His troubles were not over, however for a collie dog, who was watching what was going on, happened to get the hook caught in its tail. The fisherman thought it advisable to stop fishing as he did not know what next might get on the hook.

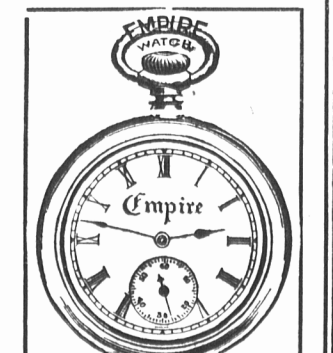
