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SOVIET ULTIMATUM CAUSES GRAVE CONCERN

INSURGENTS DEMAND SURRENDER OF MADRID

THREATEN DESTRUCTION OF CAPITAL

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BURGOS, SPAIN, Oct. 8 — (AP)—Fascist leaders tonight promised "to blow Madrid to pieces" unless it surrenders to the advancing Insurgent legions.

"We recommend that the civil population does everything in its power to make the Government surrender", read circulars showered on Madrid from Fascist warplanes.

"The greater the resistance the greater will be the attack," they read. "Madrid will be bombarded intensely from both land and air."

Fascist lines tonight hemmed in Madrid on three sides with only the Eastern sector open.

Steadily the southern and bottom side of the advance was stretched longer past Madrid. The strategy then was to march troops on this line due north, completely boxing the capital.

The Insurgent juggernaut under General Francisco Franco rolled swiftly, bowling over town after town in its path, finally halting before San Martin de Valdiglesias, where fall the Insurgent leaders expected momentarily.

Their warplanes banked and circled over Madrid throughout the day, the pilots dumping hundreds of printed surrender ultimatums upon the city's inhabitants. Further resistance was useless, the ultimatums read, and the populace had best declare allegiance to the Insurgent provisional government or suffer the same fate as Iruin, bombed and pillaged when it was captured by General Emilio Mola a month ago.

British Troops Clash With Arabs

Disorders Break-out In Palestine.

HAIFA, PALESTINE, Oct. 8—(CP)—Havas—Jews of Iraq tonight the slopes of historic Mount Carmel today as 1,500 British troops engaged a large force of Arabs in what appeared to be the most serious clash so far in the Palestine disorders.

Three Royal Air Force planes aided the troops in the fighting, which was still going on as night fell. Mortars were being used to shell the Arabs out of their positions on the rocky mountainside.

North Lancashire Infantry advanced steadily as the Arabs retreated from rock to rock.

Rifle fire and the bombing of the mortars could be clearly heard in Haifa, which lies at the foot of the mountain where according to the scriptures Elijah destroyed the Prophets of Baal.

A Carmelite monastery lies on the slope above Haifa, on the same site where the Crusader Berthold founded the Carmelite order in 1156.

18 KILLED IN CLASH

JERUSALEM, Oct. 8 — (Palcor Agency)—At least 16 men were killed or wounded in the fighting today between Arabs and British troops on Mount Carmel, preliminary

reports said.

The official report said none of the British soldiers or airmen had been wounded.

The list of Arab casualties for the day mounted to 18 when another armed Arab band made a raid on the police station at Beit Daja, Arab town near Jaffa. The police wounded two.

DISCLAIM CONNECTION

BAGHDAD, IRAQ, Oct. 8—(CP)—Havas—Jews of Iraq tonight disclaimed any political connection with their co-religionists of the Zionist movement in Palestine, according to an announcement by the Grand Rabbi of Baghdad.

Adjournment Of Quebec House

QUEBEC, Oct. 8—(CP)—The Quebec Legislative Assembly took an adjournment to Tuesday today after hearing from Jonathan Robinson (U.N. Brome) a plea for "punishment and recovery" in connection with abuses in Government administration as revealed at the Public Accounts Committee of the last legislature.

Mr. Robinson delivered his plea when he seconded the motion of Emile Boiteau (U.N. Bellechasse) for adoption of the Speech from the Throne delivered by Lieutenant-Governor Patenaude yesterday.

Represent Canada On League Body

GENEVA, Oct. 8—(CP) CABLE—Prime Minister MacKenzie King, with Senator Dandurand and O. D. Skelton, under-secretary of state for external affairs as substitutes, was named today to represent Canada on the new League of Nations assembly committee studying amendments to the League Covenant.

SINO-JAPANESE TENSION EASES

NANKING, Oct. 8—(AP)—An exchange of compliments between China's Dictator, General Kai-Shek, and Japanese Ambassador Shigeru Kawagoe was viewed here tonight as a harbinger of peace in the Orient.

After they ended a two-hour conference, the Japanese Embassy said Chiang had expressed "deep regret" over the recent killings of Japanese in China and Kawagoe said he was impressed with Chiang's sincerity.

Chiang issued a communique applauding Kawagoe's "spirit," which he said raised hope the crisis could be solved "without resort to non-diplomatic measures."

At Hankow, however, Japanese naval authorities took drastic "precautions" against a possible new incident when a "dud" bomb was discovered in a Japanese bookshop in the former British concession.

The Japanese asserted the bomb was of the type used in the Chinese army.

Legion Killer Is Given Life Term

DETROIT, Oct. 8—(AP)—Dayton Dean, talkative two-gun killer whose lurid disclosures of Black Legion terrorism aided the state's fight to stamp out the hooded night riders, received a life term for murder today from a judge who called Dean's victim "a martyr to the cause of civil and religious liberties."

Dean had pleaded guilty to shooting Charles A. Poole, young works progress administration worker, on a lonely country road last May 12 on order of a Black Legion superior officer after false gossip that Poole beat his wife, an expectant mother.

Fascist Leader Held Prisoner

ALICANTE, SPAIN, Oct. 8—(CP)—Havas—Jose Primo de Rivera, leader of the Fascist Spanish phalanx, is in prison here and will be tried for participation in the civil war, it was reported tonight.

De Rivera's whereabouts have been a mystery almost since the revolt started. At different times he has been reported as having died of wounds received while fighting at the front.

Convicted Of Manslaughter

LIVERPOOL, N.S., Oct. 8—(CP)—John Sapp, driver of a truck which struck and killed William Freeman on the highway near here last summer, was convicted of manslaughter in Supreme Court here today.

Link Gruesome Find With Disappearance Of Widow

WEYMOUTH, Mass., Oct. 8—(A. P.)—Deputy superintendent James R. Clafin of Boston declared tonight he was "sure" remembered legs of a woman found in Boston Harbor were those of a pretty 40-year-old widow, Mr. Grace Asquith, missing for three weeks.

His assertion that the widow was the victim of the gruesome harbor mystery came after police searched her summer cottage here and found, Clafin said, a blood-spattered living

room, bloodstained sheets, and pieces of burlap and a saw in the cellar.

Mrs. Asquith disappeared from the cottage three weeks ago, he declared.

Clafin said the living room of the lonely cottage had been spattered with blood. Upstairs in a bedroom, detectives found bloodstains on a bedspread and two sheets, Clafin declared.

In the cellar, he reported, police found a saw "the handle covered with brown specks."

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Papal Secretary In New York

NEW YORK, Oct. 8—(AP)—Eugenio Cardinal Pacelli, first Papal Secretary of State ever to visit this country, arrived from Rome today bearing a gently-phrased reminder that the majesty of Divine law takes precedence over all human legislation.

"The church cannot refrain from reminding peoples and those who govern them", he said, "of their duty to submit without reserve, not only in private life but also in public life to the supreme dominion of God."

POLICE RAID SOCIAL PARTY HEADQUARTERS

PARIS, Oct. 8—(CP)—Court action against Colonel Francois de la Rocque, leader of the French Social Party, will result from today's raid on his Versailles home, which netted three bludgeons, a revolver and a dagger of German origin as well as certain photographs and documents, it was reported tonight.

The raid was one of 37 carried out in quick succession by the police on the headquarters of the party and the homes of its leaders, in an effort to find proof that the organization is an illegal reconstitution of the Fascist-inclined Croix de Feu, banned last June.

The authorities were also looking for evidence that de la Rocque was guilty of "provoking to illegal

ONE DEAD IN LACHINE BLAZE

LACHINE, QUE., Oct. 8—(CP)—Fire raged through the dockyards of the Montreal Boat Builders' plant here today and left one man dead, two others severely burned and damage estimated at between \$150,000 and \$500,000 in its wake.

For a time the blaze, starting from a series of gasoline explosions, threatened the whole waterfront of this town on Lachine canal, about 12 miles west of Montreal.

The body of Fernand Duval, 28-year-old marine mechanic, was taken from the ruins some two hours after the blaze started. The injured, Ernest Charette, 24 and Albert Claude, 24, both burned about the face and chest, were rescued before the flames got well started and taken to hospital.

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\$325,000 FIRE AT STE. ANNE DE BEAUPRE

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) STE. ANNE DE BEAUPRE, Que., Oct. 8—(C.P.)—On steps leading to the hillside shrine where hundreds of thousands of pilgrims have prayed to be cured, bare-headed villagers offered their thanks tonight for the wind that protected their valuable church property from flames which destroyed 13 buildings with a loss of \$325,000.

Heavy smoke pall still lingered above the historic Roman Catholic shrine and the Basilique S. Anne de Beaupre but already plans were being made to rebuild the hospital, hotels, boarding houses and frame homes that fell prey to the early morning flames.

Believed to have originated from faulty wiring in a hotel kitchen, the blaze swept through buildings on both sides of the highway leading to the historic shrine, which legend says was founded in 1659 by shipwrecked Breton sailors, and the

SWEDISH FLYER UNINJURED

VALENTIA, IRISH FREE STATE, Oct. 8—(AP)—Cheat of victory but uninjured, Kurt Bjorkvall, 31, Sweden's trans-atlantic flyer, was enroute tonight to La Rochelle, France aboard the French trawler Imbrin.

Bjorkvall abandoned his big red and blue plane to choppy seas, 100 miles off the west coast of Ireland, where he was "rescued" yesterday after being forced down 1,000 miles short of his goal on the 4,500-mile hop from Floyd Bennett Field, New York, to Stockholm.

The Imbrin, which spotted Bjorkvall's plane wallowing on a moonlit sea late yesterday, set out for its home port after the crew had failed in an attempt to salvage the plane.

Capt. Jean Marie Dillie of the Imbrin wireless the vessel's owners that Bjorkvall was tired and "not eating."

The ship, he wirelessed, would continue its fishing, and probably arrive in La Rochelle Tuesday morning.

ACQUITTED OF MURDER

MONTREAL, Oct. 8 — (CP)—Steven Cibo, 39, was acquitted today on a charge of murdering Petros Kollivas, 32-year-old Montreal cafe proprietor, when mental experts declared him to have been of unsound mind when the crime occurred, Jan. 1, 1931.

Foreign Secretary Eden abruptly closed his month vacation and hurried homeward to take charge of the foreign office. He was to confer Friday with Premier Blum in Paris, on possible concerted action if a crisis should arise.

Britain Moves To Heal Breach In Neutrality Pact

Fear Russian Note May Precipitate Showdown Between Communism And Fascism.

(By JOHN H. MARTIN) (Associated Press Staff Writer)

LONDON, Oct. 8—(AP)—British officials strove tonight to quiet Russia's outburst against Germany, Italy, and Portugal, in which the Soviet Government charged those countries with aiding the Spanish Insurgents in violation of the non-intervention pact.

Russia's demarche, delivered Wednesday, was a follow-up to specific charges made to the neutrality committee a week ago.

An earlier note suggested "an impartial committee should be sent to the Spanish-Portuguese border to investigate on the spot the true state of affairs there."

The note said Russia has evidence which "affords reasonable presumption that Portugal has committed a break in the non-intervention agreement."

If the three countries named by Russia should retort at Friday's session of the non-intervention committee in London, many persons believed, one of the gravest situations since Germany defied the Locarno Pact might be created.

British officials expressed great anxiety lest the Russian note result in a showdown between Fascism and Communism. Recriminations at Friday's session, Government leaders feared, might break up the committee which Britain and France worked so long to set up.

The "premature publicity" given Russia's charges outside the committee sessions irritated British officials who said the pact signatories were pledged from the beginning to work privately.

The Soviet demarche declared Russia would abandon the non-intervention pact unless Germany, Italy and Portugal ceased aiding the Spanish Insurgents.

If the Soviet Government is only "bluffing" informed observers said, a long period of diplomatic bickering is ahead. On the other hand, if the Kremlin meant business, it was said, and intended to back up the Madrid Government with guns and planes Europe was faced with a crisis.
