CHEAP FARES TO TORONTO EXHIBITION.

DISCOVERIES IN FORUM.

ROME, Aug. 5.—Excavations made in the Forum of Nerva have led to the discovery of the base of the western of the two standing columns, the so-called "Colonnacce" which are all that remain of the portico of the once famous temple of Nerva, built by Domitian. These columns have long remained half-buried in the ground; the present excavations have shown that the total depth of the western column below the surface is no less than 16 feet, 4 inches. Other excavations are being carried on at the foot of the celebrated "Torre delle Milizie," vulgarly but inaccurately as the "Tower of Nero" (although it was not erected till about the year 1200). It now appears, however, that this mediaeval tower rests in part upon an ancient paved street.

Another mediaeval tower, the leaning "Torre Azzuelli" of Bologna, which was built in 1109, and is 320 ft high and 4 ft, out of the perpendicular, is at present exercising the artistic world of Italy. The fall of the Campanile of St. Mark's made the Bolognese nervous about the taller of their two leaning towers, and a commission of engineers, recently advised that it should be strengthened by hoops of iron. A discussion is also going on with regard to the restoration of the mediaeval "loggetta," erected about 1401 by the powerful Bentivoglio clan at the base of the tower.

BOMB CASES INCREASE.

DUBLIN, Aug. 5.—The Lord Chief Justice, Lord O'Brien, addressing the grand jury for the North Riding of County Tipperary at Nenagh, said that there had been a slight increase in the specially reported bomb cases. One of the bills referred to a case in which a bomb was exploded near the dwelling of a farmer named Doherty. It exploded with a tremendous noise and set fire to a portion of the house. A second bomb had also been placed in position, but the fuse was extinguished before an explosion could occur. Several cases of fires, for which no cause had been made mentionable, were reported from Templemore and the surrounding districts, and there were also cases of firing into a house and of setting fire to a house.

GERMANS AWAIT EXECUTION.

BERLIN, Aug. 5.—Two German subjects condemned to death at Windsor, in German South-West Africa, for the murder of a police sergeant are awaiting execution in grim and curious circumstances.

The law provides that white men in German Colonies shall be beheaded, but there is no official headman in South-West Africa, and no one can be found to undertake the task.

LUNATIC KILLS DOCTOR

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 5.—A terrible case occurred in the principal lunatic asylum of St. Petersburg. During the usual round and inspection by one of the medical superintendents, Doctor Grekkov, accompanied by his assistants and a nurse, one of the inmates, a shoemaker named Sizoff, who has been confined there since 1908 by order of the Court of Justice, for murdering his master while in an unsound state of mind, complained to the doctor of being very ill.

The doctor therefore, proceeded to examine him, but when he was using his stethoscope Sizoff drew from his pocket a cobbler's knife and thrust it deep into the back of the doctor's neck. The doctor immediately dropped to the ground, mortally wounded and unconscious.

A number of other inmates, greatly excited at the sight of the blood, rushed to the side of Sizoff, who was overpowered and thrust into a cell reserved for violent inmates only after a great struggle.

It is not stated how the excitement among the rest of the lunatics was quelled; but the dying doctor was removed from the building with great difficulty.

HAD TONGUE SEVERED.

PARIS, Aug. 5.—A flat in the Rue Monge was the scene of a strange tragedy when a young woman was seen rushing out with her tongue severed, and inside in one of her rooms a young man was lying on the floor, still alive and apparently a dispute followed. A number of shots were heard, and neighbors met her as she was rushing down the stairs bleeding. When the young man was found inside he was reclining on one elbow on the floor and wiping the blood from his wound with a handkerchief. The bullet was extracted from the wound as soon as he was brought to the hospital. It had entered the head near the right temple, and after traversing the skull it could be seen at the opposite side. There is little hope of saving him. The young woman was wounded in the shoulder, and another bullet struck her in the mouth. Her wounds are very painful, but they do not seem to be fatal.

CHILDREN'S HORRIBLE DEATH

DUBLIN, Aug. 5.—The circumstances of the death by burning of four children near Foxford reaches Ballina, County Mayo, this week. The children, two boys and two girls, the eldest of whom was 13 years of age and the youngest 11 years, were those of a man named Brogan. The father and mother went to cut turf, leaving the children at home. The children went into the house of a neighbor, which was occupied by an old woman, and it is stated that while there a pig entered the house and upset a jar of paraffin oil. The children tried to destroy the traces of the oil by setting it alight and the clothes of one of them caught fire. Their screams attracted the attention of the old woman, who went to their rescue, but on her clothes catching fire she jumped through a window. The clothes of the other three children also began to burn, and when a doctor arrived the four children were found to be dead. The old woman was taken to the country infirmary in a serious condition.
