**CHARLOTTETOWN AND QUEEN'S COUNTY**

It will be interesting to note that in the recent Dominion election in this city the vote was larger than in 1908 by 47 votes while for the whole county the vote was about 300 below the polling of 1908. In 1908 the total vote for the province was 28,782 and in 1911 about 28,600.

W. S. Lea, who was resident engineer for this city during the construction of the sewerage system and filtration plant, has lately accepted the position of water works superintendent for the city of Vancouver, at a salary of \$3,250. His brother, R. S. Lea, a well-known consulting engineer of Montreal, is in charge of the greater Vancouver sewerage scheme.—Frederick Ex. (Mr Lea, and also his brother referred to above, is a native of Victoria, P. E. I.)

Sunday School Rally Day was observed Sunday last at Vernon River and Cherry Valley Methodist churches with good congregations. At the former place the Pastor Rev George Orman was assisted by E. Percy Rowe, Sunday School Superintendent and A. S. Nicholson, Valleyfield East, the latter gentleman delivering an excellent and earnest address on Sunday School work with special reference to the Temperance pledge. The singing was hearty and the responsive readings clearly given. Services at Vernon River next Sunday morning and evening. Sacrament in the morning.

The many friends of Mrs Lawson wife of Rev. William Lawson, pastor of Zion Methodist church, will learn with sincere regret of her death, which took place in the General Hospital about one o'clock this morning. The end came with startling suddenness, although to her physicians and intimate friends it was plain yesterday afternoon and evening that the patient was in a critical condition. She was taken to the hospital a week ago for a slight operation, and appeared to be doing well until Saturday night, when she suffered a relapse. Besides her husband she is survived by two daughters, Miss L. E. Lawson, a missionary in China, and Miss Mary Lawson, who has been engaged in missionary work in the west but who is now at home. Mrs Lawson was very active in church work and during her husband's service in different parts of the province she made a great number of friends who will be shocked at the news of her death. Great sympathy will be tendered Mrs Lawson and his daughters in their bereavement.—St. John Ex. (Mr and Mrs Lawson are both well known here.)

An exchange says Prince Edward Island will lose one seat after redistricting. Canada's fifth census, begun in June, has been completed, and the official figures will be made public within a few days, and soon as the returns are in from the far-off Yukon and Northwest districts. While the figures in hand will not be given out in detail, many of the facts disclosed by the census are available. First among these is the fact that Canada's total population is well up to the eight million mark, which enthusiastic prophets had foretold. The return show that Toronto and Montreal have made the largest gains in population. The former has the greatest percent age of gain, and the latter the largest gain in numbers. The Maritime Provinces, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia have not grown as have Quebec and other provinces, but that they have more than held their own is about as strong as the census official will put it. The gains in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia were confined practically to Halifax and the mining sections. Prince Edward Island has stood still. The Province of Quebec will show large gains all around, both in town and country. All the cities and towns increased, and the increase included the rural districts. The large increase in the Province of Quebec will raise the basis of representation in the House of Commons from 25,000 to 30,000. This will result in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick each losing two seats and in Prince Edward Island losing one seat. Ontario will certainly gain no members and may lose one or two. The provinces west of Lake Superior will gain about 27 additional members, which will increase the membership of the House of Commons, after redistribution, from 221 to 241 members.

James B. Coulson, Circulation Manager of the Worcester Post, arrived in the city by the S. S. A. W. Perry. Mr Coulson is a native of Rustico, but for a number of years has been a resident of Worcester, where he has achieved marked success in newspaper work.

The funeral of the late D. J. Bruce, Campbellton, formerly of this city, took place at the former place Monday. On Sunday evening a memorial service of the combined churches and choirs of the town in memory of the late D. J. Bruce was held in the theatre here, being led by Rev Mr Drumm, pastor of the Presbyterian church; Rev Dr Britain, pastor of the Baptist church, and Rev Mr Morris, pastor of the Methodist church. Mr Drumm chose John, 15-13, for his text and preached an eloquent sermon in memory of Mr Bruce. All classes, said Mr Drumm, have suffered a loss they can hardly grasp. Without referring to the tragic circumstances of his death, I would say that our departed brother laid down his life for the people of Campbellton as truly as did those martyrs of old who gave up their lives at the stake. He died upholding his sincere belief and convictions, and in the name of God, said Mr Drumm, let us put an end to the infamous traffic before it claims any more victims. He spoke of the deceased's energetic character and manly and Christian attributes, his generosity and high ideals, his attachment to his church and home, and said he had left behind an exceedingly precious memory. The pastor expressed the deep sympathy of himself and others for the bereaved family. Before the service closed, the organist played the Dead March in 'Auld' and there was scarcely a dry eye in the theatre. Doherty, who is under arrest in the case has been removed to Dalhousie gaol, where, it is reported, he takes the matter very lightly. It is thought that matters will go hard with him as it is reported that on a previous occasion some years ago he hit a local doctor with a heavy cane and at another time struck a local barrister over the head with a glass pitcher.
