TO IMPROVE FAMILY LIFE

NEW YORK, N. Y., April 20—Miss Portia Mansfield, "Creator of correctives in dance form," comes long with an idea for making family life happier and averting divorces and such things. Dance she says, and presto, everything's OK.

Her scheme is to dance away one's ugly moods; sort of two-step out of trouble, waltz out of woe, fox-trot out of folly and rumba out of ruts. "It's perfectly feasible," she said today. "There would be fewer divorces, fewer family squabbles, if women would adopt the dance as a corrective. I have seen women who saw no way out of their emotional troubles. Then they did a corrective dance, and life seemed suddenly simple again."

The reason it works, she explained, is through the increased circulation of sluggish blood and freedom of movement, which tends to consequent exhilaration with resultant change of mood.

COOPERATION FOR PARIS WORKERS

PARIS, April 20. (U. P.)—By the end of 1932 artisans here will be offered combined workshop flats as well as ordinary workshops in a group of buildings which have been planned especially for them along modern lines. At the end of 25 years the tenants will, through their annual rents, have paid for their own flats and workshops and enter into undisputed proprietorship.

TRAVELLING LABORATORY WILL FIGHT MALARIA

GLASGOW, April 20—A travelling tango-laboratory in Tanganyika is under construction here.

The motor-laboratory will be used specifically for malaria investigation. The interior measures 10 feet by 6 feet and five windows are fitted—two on each side and one on the door, which is at the rear. The windows, louvres and other openings are covered with copper gauze on the inside to render them proof against the dangerous Tsetse fly. The van is also fitted with a special electrical plant.

500th Anniversary Of Francois Villon Birth

PARIS, April 20—If Francois Villon, French poet, and friend of the underworld, could return to Paris this year the 500th anniversary of his birth, he would search in vain for the haunts of his youth, but he would find only one tavern to remind him of his tempestuous days here.

On the site of the old "Pomme de Pin"—the Firocne Tavern—in the Rue de L'Hirondelle, near the Place Saint Michel, where the pioneer of French poetry played many jokes on Robin Turgis, the stout inn-keeper, there now stands the "Bole de Cider" (The Cider Bowl). Repaired and remodelled, it still retains most of the original features of the poet's day. At the time of Villon the tavern was a gathering place for literary men and painters. It is often mentioned in his writings.

Although the day and month of Villon's birth are indefinite, it is generally accepted that the year was 1431. Consequently a society called "The Disciples of Francois Villon," which was organized before the war at the Cider Bowl is planning a memorial service there within the next few weeks. The group was founded by Guillaume Appollinaire, Francis Carco, a Villon biographer, and Jacques Dyssord, the poet.

During the French revolution the tavern building was a meeting place for leaders of the revolution, many of their secret councils being held in its subterranean vaults. Until a few years ago it was a rendezvous for rivermen, stevedores and workers from the market. After the armistice it became a cabaret.

Until 1920 there hung on the walls of the Cider Bowl a framed parchment, said to have been a stanza of the original from Villon's "Grand Testament." This was written in 1461 upon his release from Meung jail when Louis XI ascended the throne. The parchment, which was stolen in 1820, referred to a gift the poet was making to the owner of the Firocne tavern and contained a promise "henceforth to pay for my wine."

The date of Villon's death has baffled historians, some placing it in 1440 and others the following year. After his last sentence to banishment for ten years, the execution of Regnier de Montigny and the pailing of Guy Tabarie, Villon's bosom friends, the poet left Paris never to return.

TO HELP JAPANESE WOMEN MINERS

TOKYO, April 20—New laws to aid the 50,000 Japanese women who work in the mines is contemplated here. Economic experts have decided that long hours and working conditions generally are doing much harm to the women, especially mothers.

Japan has approximately 1,600,000 women manual workers, most of whom are employed in factories. A report of the Kurashiki Institute for Labor Research, has just urged better treatment for the women workers. The report declares many mothers undergo extreme mental and physical strain under present working conditions to maintain their subsistence. It emphasizes the necessity of raising the minimum working age for women from 14 to 16 years, increasing wages of employees and making greater milk allowances for working mothers.

NINE MONTHS FOR HALF PINT

SANFORD, Me., April 20—Judge Edward S. Titcomb fined Carmille Marseau, 19, \$300 and costs and sentenced him to three months in Alford jail for illegal transportation of liquor. When Marseau was unable to pay the fine an additional six months was imposed. A half-pint of alcohol had been found in his possession.

COUNTIES FORM TAX ASS'N

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., April 20—Practically all counties in Western States having claims against the government for money lost through not getting taxes from Indian reservation lands, located within the counties, have joined an association being perfected by County Commissioner Williams of Clatsop. The association expects to press such claims in congress, which will include moneys expended for schools, roads and other public works.

Advises Women To Stop Imitating Models

NEW YORK, April 20—Private advice to every woman: Quit trying to look like a dress model. It can't be done.

Take that on the authority of Mlle. Gabrielle Chanel, Paris couturiere, who was in New York recently on her way home from Hollywood, where she had been reforming the style scene of the movies with the view of making feminine screen clothes more dramatic and endowing them with more sex appeal.

"It is impossible for any woman to look like a mannequin," said Mlle. Chanel, "for the reason that the mannequin does not live in the costume she displays—that she may look charming during a brief walk before her observers."

"She does not have to be continually sitting down and standing up; she does not have to have comfort in her clothes, for she wears them only a short time. With the company in ordinary life, that is not true."

It is similarly impossible, said Mlle. Chanel, for either Judy O'Grady or the colonel's lady to look like the cinematic well dressed woman. In the movies, it seems, each evening gown is provided with a series of slips. One is used when the wearer is standing up. It insures proper draping of the skirt. Another is worn when the lady sits. It permits of a bit of give here and there and keeps the upper part of the costume properly in place. All this is very well in the movies, but Mlle. Chanel points out, in real life a woman can't change to another slip each time she wants to sit down.

Designing for the movies is different than designing for real life, Mlle. Chanel finds. Costumes must be more striking must be pointed up, just as human joys and sorrows are pointed up to make material for screen and stage. Extra doses of sex appeal are one of the methods of making theatre clothes dramatic, she says.

High Powered Business Woman Terrifying Figure

NEW YORK, April 20—"Babbit," romanticizing his business, is merely a comic and pathetic figure, but his female counterpart, the high-powered business woman is the most terrifying figure that has ever emerged upon any scene," declared Mrs. Sinclair Lewis, wife of Babbit's creator, in a recent interview here. "Men may be forgiven for exalting their business as the supreme ends of their lives. But women, with their sounder biological instincts, should know better. They should know that that's not life. Most women, at heart, suspect the futility of counter jumping. That is why they're not good business women—thank heaven that they're not."

Herself a journalist of note, and author of the book on Russia which led to plagiarism charges against Theodore Dreiser and the famous face slapping incident between Dreiser and her husband, Mrs. Lewis reveals herself as severe a critic of the American woman as Lewis himself is of the American man.

The real job of women, as Mrs. Lewis sees it, is not to try to build taller skyscrapers than men, nor to build up bigger corporations, but to make a satisfactory society. And even in this, Mrs. Lewis believes, American women have fallen down colossal. The "feminine" woman, immersed in books and pictures and schemes of interior decoration, ardent devotee of the electric refrigerator, is just as much a failure in her eyes as the supersaleslady.

"I mean," explained Mrs. Lewis, "that the real work of woman lies in the field of human relationships—between members of a family, people in a room acquaintances. It's their job to make life more beautiful, livable bearable. It takes a creative gift which American women do not possess in any such degree, as, for instance, the Viennese."

The women of Sweden with whom Mrs. Lewis came into contact on her recent visit there for the awarding of the Nobel prize to Mr. Lewis, she instances as having a peculiarly happy combination of economic and legal independence, with a beautiful domestic culture.

NOAH'S ARK STRANDED ON DATE NEAR THAT OF PRESENT EASTER

LONDON, Eng., April 20—Stranding of Noah's Ark is believed by Colonel F. C. Molesworth, who has done considerable research in semitic sources, to have occurred in the 17th day of Nisam, very close to our own Easter Sunday.

In a recent speech before the Victoria Institute, Colonel Molesworth said he deduced, because of reference to dates appearing in the biblical account of the flood, that Noah must have kept a log.

"The narrative of the flood throws considerable light on the calendar in use in early times," he said. "Five specific dates are mentioned, as well as five periods of time varying from seven to 150 days. Such exact dating

does not again recur in the bible for over 10,000 years, until the exodus." Col. Molesworth said the period of 150 days was mentioned as equivalent to five months and he assumed the month was fixed at 30 days with dead reckoning utilized on days when it stormed.

"The months had not yet been named," he said, "and the system of recognizing them by numerals was more widely used. However, if we assume, with Josephus, the months of Noah's life coincided with those of the calendar year, the Ark was stranded on the 17th of Nisam, or consequently, very close to our Easter Day."

EXODUS FROM AUSTRALIA

CANBERRA, Australia, April 20—A remarkable exodus of population from Australia is in progress, most of the travellers being British emigrants, disheartened by the hardships they have suffered. Some who enthusiastically commenced wheat farming and secured big crops have been ruined by the fall in grain prices.

During the past year departures from Australia exceeded arrivals by 9,588 and the exodus is growing each

week. During the previous year arrivals exceeded in departures by 10,733 persons. Another noticeable effect of the depression and the huge fall in Australia's national income is the decrease of overseas tourist traffic from Australia. Shipping companies report that they are carrying thousands fewer tourists than in previous seasons.

CAPS BURNED IN COFFIN

WAKE FOREST, N. C., April 20—Wake Forest College freshmen departed from their old tradition of hurling their old gold and black caps into a fire, and this year the caps were laid to rest in a specially prepared coffin which was thrown into the blaze.

LONDON POLICE FIND MANY DEAD

LONDON, April 20—Police found 129 persons dead on the streets of London during January and February, exclusive of accidents, J. Clynne, Home Secretary, told the House of Commons. They were 85 men, 30 women and 14 children under 16 years of age.

COPS SEEK GOLDFISH THIEF
SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, April 20—Salt Lake's gold fish thief—probably a venturesome little boy—is still at large. Two raids were made on the E. E. Scott gold fish pool. On the first visitation 13 brilliant fish were taken; on the second 17.
