Missing City Man Found In Montreal

Plans for a brief covering matters of Province-wide interest to be presented at the meeting of the Board of Transport Commissioners on May 30th were discussed at the quarterly meeting of the Charlottetown Board of Trade last night.

In the absence of the President, Capt. Carl Burke, Mr. M. A. Farmer presided.

Mr. B. Graham Rogers, who as chairman of the transportation committee of the Board, is compiling and will present the brief representing the views of the Charlottetown Board, said he was finding the compilation an arduous task.

Mr. Rand Mathieson, secretary of the Maritime Transport Commission, had been in the City some time ago, Mr. Rogers said, and had given him many valuable suggestions respecting certain recommendations. Mr. Mathieson had suggested that the larger exporters of fish should also be contacted with the object of having their views on the effect of a freight rate increase of 30 per cent on the fishing industry.

Mr. Rogers said that Mr. W. R. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, would present a brief before the Commissioners on behalf of the Province's agricultural industry and that another brief dealing specifically with the interests of potato growers would be presented by Mr. J. W. Boulier.

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Parliament At A Glance

Agriculture Minister Gardiner said the Government was prepared to discuss with the provinces plans for development of certain agricultural lands.

Finance Minister Abbott promised consideration of a question as to what the Government planned to do about storing of gold by McIntyre-Porcupine Mines, Ltd.

W. D. Wylie (SC-Medicine Hat) urged the Government discontinue the system of having income tax payments deducted from payrolls.

Donald Fleming (PC-Toronto Eglinton) termed the income tax reductions "trifling" and "inadequate."

A. L. Smith (PC-Calgary West) said a research staff should be available to assist private members of the Commons with their work.

Marcel Boivin (L-Shefford) said workers should be given income tax exemptions which would allow them to meet their obligations.

Frederic Dorion (Ind.-Charlevoix-Saguenay) argued the provinces had a priority on direct tax fields by the B.N.A. Act.

Nearly a dozen members participated in the budget debate.

Friday: The Commons will continue the budget debate. The Senate will not sit.

Missing City Man Found In Montreal

SAINT JOHN, N. B., May 22—(CP)—New Brunswick Government and industry joined today in a stand against the Canadian railways' effort to hoist freight rates.

The Province's Government told the Board of Transport Commissioners flat percentage rate jumps would react against the economy of the Maritimes, and industry and business—as heard through the Maritime Board of Trade—set out the same view.

These submissions came as the board opened its regional sessions—to hear those in opposition to rate boosts—after spending three months in Ottawa taking testimony on behalf of the railways' application for a general 20-per-cent increase on charges that would amount to about \$87,000,000 a year.

More Battling

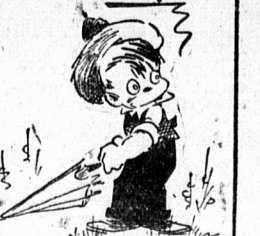
Though only four witnesses took the stand today, the session saw more concentrated battling than any sitting of the protracted Ottawa stand. Opposing counsel for the Maritime Provinces and for the railways—kept up steady barrage of sniping that developed occasionally into sharp, acridulous interchanges.

Involved in the battling, too, was New Brunswick's Minister of Education and Federal and Municipal Relations, Hon. C. H. Blackburn, who at one stage refused to answer a question from railway counsel on the ground that "I don't want to."

Before and after this collision, counsel hurled back and forth such accusations as "badgering" of witnesses, "unfair" methods of cross-examination and "tilting at windmills."

Most of these bouts came between Col. J. L. Ralston, chief counsel for the Maritimes, and G. F. H. Carson of Montreal, representing the Railway Association of Canada. At times, their jousts
