RAILWAY DISPUTE HAPPILY ENDED

Increase of 7 Percent Granted to Employees Costing \$6,000,000 Annually.

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—The long-lived controversy between the railroads of the east and their conductors and trainmen over the latter's demands for more pay ended tonight when the employees granted an increase in wages averaging seven per cent. and totalling about \$6,000,000 annually, about half what they wanted from October 1st last, and effective for one year.

DIAZ ADVISES HUERTA TO RESIGN

Putting Prestige and Position Behind Him Rather Than Involve Mexico in Calamity.

(Canadian Press) PARIS, Nov. 10.—General Porfirio Diaz has advised Huerta to retire from the presidency of Mexico. Two friends of Diaz, each acting separately, sent telegrams last week to Huerta to this effect.

In considering the present situation between Mexico and the United States, Diaz said it was not a question whether Huerta was the best man for the position but a question of patriotism. He counselled Huerta to put prestige and position behind him rather than involve Mexico in calamity. Diaz has hitherto refused to take part in the discussion of Mexican affairs and only does so in realization of the gravity of the situation.
