## Red Sox Dominate American League Team For All-Star Competition

CHICAGO, July 4 (AP)—Boston Red Sox, well the championship race, captured six places to dominate the 25-player American League squad named today for the major league all-star game at Brooklyn July 12.

Although there was no official news forthcoming from Bridgewater, N.S., and Bathurst, N.B., concerning how two Charlottetown boxers, Harry "Kid" Poulton and Beau Jack, fared out in Dominion Day boxing cards there, it was learned unofficially yesterday that Poulton scored a five-round K.O. over his mainland opponent at Bridgewater as the semi-final go in the Uplaw-Jackson scrap, while Beau Jack lost out on a six-round decision to Billy Snowball of New-castle on a card held at Bathurst, which also cost the local fighter a couple of cracked ribs for his efforts.

The hope on the Beau's scrap is official enough, however, as the writer had a brief chat with him yesterday, in which he stated that he was doing o. k. up until the 6th round, in fact figured he had a slight edge up until that time, but received a terrific wallop on the ribs in that round which pretty well crippled him and although he did not realize the seriousness at the time, found out later that he had two broken ribs.

It looks like tomorrow is going to be a really big race day at Montague track when five fast classes go to the wire in the regular Wednesday afternoon program. Archie Skinner of the host Algonquin Club, professional champion in 1941 and 1947, turned in a brilliant 68 under a sweltering sun to pace the 12 pros for the first 18 holes.

Oliver (Boots) Baird of New Glasgow, N.S., much-travelled Maritime hockey player, was runner-up in the pro-six-hole lead, 73, two strokes behind leader. Al MacPherson of Moncton, N.B., were tied for third with 77.

Tied with Don Sinclair of Riverside, N.B., and Ben Grey of Edmundston, N.B., for last place in pro competition was Cecil Dowling of Charlottetown, who finished amateur and open titles last year, who shot a disappointing 84.

Ralph Harley of Moncton, former N.B.-P.E.I. amateur champion, and present Nova Scotia titleholder, carded 77 and tied in a sixth-place tie with John Steacie of Riverside, N.B., and H. McFarlane of St. Andrews. They were one stroke back of Bud Caldwell of Woodstock, N.B., and V.C. Andrews of Moncton.

Frank Purton of St. Andrews fired a 74 to hold a two-stroke lead in the second division, over J.R. Chipman of Toronto. Next in line were Jack Willmott of Moncton and David Caughy of St. Andrews with 80's.

Third division leader is Elwood Greenough of St. Croix, N.B., who with a 91 had a two-stroke lead over Jack Wade of Riverside. Gerald Lawson of St. Andrews shot an 86 for a four-stroke lead over E.A. Bradley of Riverside in the fourth division.
