FREE TRADE FIGHT

Wilson Says the Tariff War is but Begun

The Fight Will be Continued Until the Trusts and Combines are Completely Destroyed.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—Mr. W. L. Wilson, the tariff reformer, and author of the Wilson tariff bill, in an address to his constituents, who have renominated him as their representative, speaking of the struggle for tariff reform in Congress says:—

"I need not recite to you the successive steps, the material and helpful alterations through which the House bill has quietly passed into law without the signature and approval of the President, who was elected upon this issue of the tariff reform and who anticipated as the signal triumph and historic achievement of his administration the privilege of affixing his name to a genuine and thorough reform bill. You know by what influences this was brought about. The country knows, and history will know, where to put the responsibility for our partial failure to redeem our pledges to the people, and our partial failure to dilodge the great privileged interests from our tariff."

THE LESSON OF FAILURE. I am not sure that this very failure may not be the harbinger and assurance of a speedier and more complete triumph of commercial freedom, than the smooth and unobstructed passage of the House bill would have been. The American people are aroused, as hardly anything else could have aroused them, to the deadly menace which protection begets to the purity and the very existence of free government. They have seen a great trust empowered by our tariff to control the production and sale of a necessary of life, parcelling out the country with its partners, and using its law-made wealth and power to thwart the best efforts of the people to reduce their own taxation.

They have seen it hold up Congress for weeks and have heard its minions boldly declare that there should be no tariff bill in which its interests were not fully protected, and that they have realized the final fulfilment of that boast. When the sugar trust

CHALLENGES THE AMERICAN PEOPLE to a contest of strength its days are numbered; its temporary triumph is its speedier and more complete overthrow, and with its overthrow will vanish its sisterhood of monopolies that are stronger through its support.

But, my friends, there is another and a brighter side to this picture. With all its manifold failures, its final retention of many protective duties, its objectionable sugar schedule, and its excessive duties on cottons and woolsens and metals, the new bill carries in it very substantial relief to the American people, and must be accepted as a substantial beginning of thorough progressive tariff reform. It means cheaper clothing, cheaper tools, cheaper pottery and many other necessities for the people. It means freer and larger commerce with those nations that buy our farm products and consequently larger and better markets for our farmers. It means a transfer of some of

THE BURDENS OF GOVERNMENT from what goes out for the daily purchase of the necessities of life to that which comes in over and above the amount needed for such purchase. If we denounce some of its duties and rates, it is because what may be much lower than the duties and rates of the McKinley bill are yet enormities in a Democratic bill.

But, as the Presidents well said, we have gained a vantage ground from which we shall continue to shell the camp of monopoly. The day of mad protection is over in this country; McKinleyism will disappear as a dark and hideous blight from our statute-books. The fight will go on, not, it may be, in such a general engagement and protracted struggle as we have just passed through, but in that steady and relentless pressure that will take one after another of the strongholds of privilege, until all shall disappear before the advance of public opinion and public emancipation.

New Steamship Line.

TO FLY BETWEEN BOSTON AND MARITIME PORTS.

HALIFAX, N. S., Sept. 13.—The rumors regarding a proposed deal, in the steamship lines running between Boston and Nova Scotia ports are assuming a more definite shape. Burdett, Farrar & Co., bankers of Boston, have sent circulars to the shareholders of the Yarmouth Steamship Company asking for a three months' option on the stock at 70 per cent. of its face value. The paid-up capital is over \$400,000. Hon. L. E. Baker, president of the company, is said to be getting control of the stock at the same figure.

Leading to Free Trade.

EUROPEAN TARIFF TROUBLES HAVE THAT EFFECT.

LONDON, Sept. 13.—Sir Albert Kay Rolit, M. P., chairman of the Associated Chambers of Commerce for the United Kingdom, presided today at the autumn meeting of that body at Huddersfield. In his address the Chairman congratulated the members upon the improved outlook of the world's trade and continued: "In Russia, France, Spain, and in the British Colonies of Victoria and New South Wales the bitter experience of the effects of exclusive tariff is opening the way to free trade. The tariffs of foreign nations are shown to have injured not only British trade, but their own. Retaliation has proved to be disastrous and reciprocity has been exploded, notably the failures of the reciprocity clauses of the McKinley law. Economic eccentricity will not pay any nation."

"Ouida's" Plea for Mercy.

THE NOVELIST ATTACKS CRISPI FOR ALLYED PERSECUTIONS.

LONDON, Sept. 12.—"Ouida" (Louisa de la Ramée), the well known novelist, has written a long letter to Truth, making a forceful attack upon Signor Crispi, the Italian prime minister, for his treatment of political prisoners, whom "Ouida" calls his unhappy victims. The letter deals chiefly with the case of Giuseppe de Felice Guiffrida, who represented the second Campania district in the Chamber of Deputies, and who was recently sentenced to a long term of imprisonment for the part he took in the socialistic troubles in Sicily.

"Ouida" says that this prisoner is the one Signor Crispi dreads, and therefore persecutes the worst. He is confined in a cage, the dimensions of which are three by five metres, in the fortress at Volterra. He is doomed to three years' solitary confinement, after which he will have to serve "Ouida" says, a score of years at hard labor, working in total silence. The government, the writer contends, calculate that this solitary confinement will drive him mad.

Tryon News.

As the Tryon Woolen Mills Co. now fills all its orders from the head office at Tryon, it has fitted up a separate apartment conveniently arranged for the storing of all stock as it is manufactured. The manager, Mr. S. E. Reid, has by considerable experimenting succeeded in producing a soft fleeced equal to if not in advance of that of Scotch goods. In navy blue and black serge he is turning out something uncommonly neat and the color of which is guaranteed to stand as well as that of more expensive cloths.

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SHANGHAI, Sept. 14.—Two thousand buildings in the town of Le Chung were destroyed by fire and fully one hundred lives were lost. The Korean troops attacked the Japanese advance guard, over two thousand strong, marching against Seoul and killed or captured fourteen hundred of them. The whole of Southern Korea has risen against the Japs and it is expected that they will attack Fusan, where the Japs are centered. The British Commander has warned his men not to listen to the offers of Chinese agents to desert and enlist with them.

BE-LIN, Ohio, Sept. 14.—Prof. Wright, one of the Cook Arctic expedition says that nearly the entire crew of the Miranda were so drunk when she sank that they had to be assisted from the vessel. He says the reef she struck was clearly marked on the chart.

A Prince will be Humbled.

LONDON, Sept. 14.—Proceedings have been begun at Madrid against prince Traviere, Marie of Bourbon, who recently claimed heritage to the Crown of France. He will be recalled from his military command.

Failure of Crops in Kansas.

FORT SCOTT, Sept. 14.—People here abouts are selling hogs for one dollar per head rather than let them starve, the failure of the crops in Kansas having made the feeding of them impossible. The animals will be transported.

Duke of Orleans will Travel.

LONDON, Sept. 15.—The Duke of Orleans will give up Stowe House, the home of his father, the Count of Paris. He will live in London and will travel extensively, visiting various European courts.

Favors Penny Postage.

SIR A. P. CARON SAYS CANADA WOULD WELCOME IT. LONDON, Sept. 11.—The Daily Chronicle today publishes an interview of one column and a half with the Canadian Postmaster General, Sir A. P. Caron, and it attaches great importance to his statement that Canada favors the Imperial penny postage system.

Sir A. P. Caron said: "One thing alone has blocked the way up to the present time, and that is the Colonial interdiction. In this country there is a practical unanimity in favor of it. It is quite a mistake," the Postmaster General added, "to suppose that Canada would object to a penny rate from England to the Dominion. On the contrary, we would welcome it as part of the onward march of civilization." The Daily Chronicle (Government) urges the establishment of the system between Britain and Canada.
