In combating with the nuisance at Railway wharf and station, it occurs to The Guardian that the remedy could best be applied and the difficulty easily overcome by the joint action of the Steam Navigation Company, the Railway authorities and a policeman engaged by the latter with the appointment from the Town Council. In the first place the Steam Navigation Company could, through their officials, take upon themselves the responsibility of keeping the gangway of the steamer clear. Then the Railway officials, conductor or brakemen or both, could stand by the train and direct passengers to the cars and prevent others from crowding the trains. This arrangement should be made to work smoothly at least after a few evenings of strict "iron-rule" enforcement. When the station is reached the same Railway officials could in the same manner handle the passengers there; and the policeman would be expected to keep order, prevent crowding and generally assist the officers in charge of the trains. In dealing with the question the Town Council at a meeting Monday evening voiced the opinion that the matter was one of single interest to the steamboat and railway authorities who have the passengers in charge, and who alone have control of the travelling public going over their lines; and when it should be necessary to hand over to the officers of the law a disorderly bystander or a troublesome passenger, let a proper official be on hand to deal with the offender. The Town Council questions the right to pay out of citizens' money towards an expenditure which is considered the Railway and steamboat companies' alone are managing for their own pecuniary interests; and hence the passing of a resolution at the last meeting of the Board offering the appointment of a policeman at the expense of the railway. It might be mentioned here that such expense would be but trifling when it is considered that the only time the services of such policeman would be required would be for about one hour each evening during the arrival of the steamer and the departure of the trains, and the work could be done by one of the Summerside policemen while off regular duty for a small remuneration.
