Notes by the Way

It is expected the Hon. J. A. Macdonald, of King's, member of the Meighen Government, will return home tonight.

It is the traditional practice when a Government resigns that it should display a decent spirit of accommodation towards its successor.

Mr. Meighen found himself temporarily in a position of embarrassment; he was for one thing anxious to avoid a long adjournment which would have forced members to return to Ottawa in August or September.

For the next two months Mr. King will go raving and ranting up and down the country, trying to inflame popular sentiment against Lord Byng and the British connection.

The general election has upset the plans of Hon. P. C. Larkin, Canadian High Commissioner in London, who intended visiting Ottawa at the end of the current month.

That the Western grain belt would in time become the premier dairy-producing section of Canada, was the opinion expressed by an Island Dairy Commissioner, L. A. Gibson, of the Manitoba Government.

Something of the growth of the industry in Manitoba was explained by Mr. Gibson when he said that in 1912, between 50 and 60 carloads of creamery butter had been shipped into Manitoba from Ontario and Quebec.

In 1915 Manitoba produced enough butter to meet market requirements and also shipped out of the Province 50 carloads. This had been increasing each year until, in 1925, the Province had exported 325 carloads, valued at \$2,500,000.

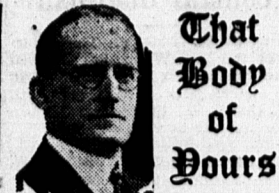

It is gratifying to see that the medical colleges are beginning to realize that learning how to cure sick people is only one part of the work they should be teaching their students.

When we realize that a few weeks of one year is all the time that is devoted to hygiene, and another few weeks to the study of infective organisms, we can readily see that the student has to learn many things about preventive medicine after he leaves college.

Well, when you remember that the colleges are giving an extra course of one year on what is called public health, and that is a step in the right direction, but there isn't one physician in each graduating class that takes this course, according to statistics.

Further it teaches how the individual and the community can be rendered practically free from some scourges by proper methods. It teaches also all about the various methods of obtaining pure drinking water whether from lakes, rivers, or springs.

PROGRESSIVE GROUP PLY THE KNIFE ON OLD PARTIES HISTORICUS

The opportunist regime of Hon. Mackenzie King came to grief a few days ago at the hands of the Progressive group which they have been codding since they took them into their confidence rather than go back to the country in order to secure a stable majority in Parliament.

Coincident with the downfall of the King Government the Hon. Arthur Meighen and followers have floated into power at the call of His Excellency Viscount Byng, Governor-General, who evidently despaired of Mr. King being able to patch up his ministry out of the fragments made of it by the treachery of his group followers.

Considerable criticism has been hurled at His Excellency by the Liberal press; but we fail to see why he should be selected as the target of the competing parties.

The leader of the "group" cut a sorry figure at the last stage of the struggle. While matters were floating along with the tide he appeared to better advantage, but now that the nursing-bottle is gone, he collapses.

He has now been stripped of his disguise and has to reckon with the electorate of the west, and if they are not as bereft of a sense of honor as he is they will give him and his group their conge when they appear back on the prairie battlegrounds.
