CITY AND COUNTRY

The Monument Fund Concert, which was to have been held last evening was postponed till Tuesday evening next.

THE P. W. C. students held their usual debate in the College last evening. The subject "Resolved, That the abolition of slavery was not beneficial to the Negro," was opened by Mr. B. H. Whiston in favor of the resolution. He was followed and vigorously opposed by F. McKenna. Mr. Whiston was supported by Messrs. Sweet, Ludlow Sharpe, Col. Ellis, B. McIntosh, H. Toombs, George McMillan, while Messrs. J. F. McLeod, Lea Seaman, Artie Doyle, R. N. McNeill and Fred Bremner, upheld Mr. McKenna's arguments. The house being divided the majority voted against the resolution. At the close of the meeting it was moved by H. Toombs, seconded by George McMillan and carried that the subject for next night be "Resolved, that (suffrage) right of voting be extended to the women."

THE Supreme Court met at Georgetown yesterday, Chief Justice Sullivan presiding. J. A. Mathieson, Esq., Prothonotary, G. A. Aitken and D. H. Logan, keeper of the King's County Jail, took the oath of allegiance. The Chief Justice in his address to the Jury referred to the death of Her late Majesty, and to the accession of King Edward VII. The docket is a heavy one and the Court will last for some time. The only criminal case is that of the King on the prosecution of Dr. G. A. C. McIntosh vs George McKay, assault to do actual bodily harm. There are a large number of witnesses to be examined.
