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Conacher Is Acquired By New York Rangers

NEW YORK, Oct. 23 (CP) — Roy Conacher, 31-year-old forward who was top-scoring left wing in the National Hockey League last year, has been acquired from Detroit Red Wings in a trade for Eddie Slowinski, New York Rangers announced today.

Detroit will obtain Slowinski, formerly with Ottawa Senators of the Quebec Senior League, and a player not yet selected who will be delivered at the end of the 1947-48 season.

No clash was involved in the deal, second major transaction involving Rangers in the last four months.

Conacher, youngest member of the famous hockey family which includes Lionel and Charlie Conacher, scored 30 goals and 47 assists last season, his goal total being topped only by Maurice Richard of Montreal Canadiens who tallied 45 times. Richard plays right wing.

Conacher has been a salary hold-out this season and has not played in any Detroit games to date. It is expected that manager Frank Boucher of the Rangers will use him at left wing on a line with Buddy O'Connor and Bryan Hextall.

Slowinski has been playing that spot with Rangers.

British Ryder Cup Team In U. S. For Game

By GAVIE TALBOT NEW YORK, Oct. 23 (AP) — Something new in the way of British sports teams reached these shores today when the redoubtable Henry Cotton led his Ryder Cup golfers down the Queen Mary's gangplank.

Henry and his fellow professionals made it immediately clear that they expect to wallop the pick of United States money players in the sporty visitor from Britain to their two-day international match at Portland, Ore., opening Nov. 1.

"We didn't come over here to lose," Cotton said a couple of minutes after his feet hit the pier. "We have a team of sound players and we have every bit of confidence. This is the best cup team I've ever played on."

This was most unusual. It has been customary in such cases for the sporty visitor from Britain to venture that "we intend to have a jolly good try at your fellows," but never, either directly or by implication, to admit that he was thinking seriously of winning.

The men who got in today obviously are a different breed. Not only Cotton, but each of them, individually, declared without coaxing that he was a member of a fine golf team imbued with a winning spirit.

Cotton reminded his fellow professionals never had won on this side of the Atlantic. The Ryder Cup matches started in 1929, but added smilingly that "we hope to do better than the other teams."

Besides Cotton and Rees, the British squad includes Fred Daly of Ireland, Britch open and P.G.A. champion; James Adams of Scotland, and Mix Faulkner, Reginald Home, Sam King, Arthur Lees, Eric Green and Charles Ward, all of England.

MONCTON, N.B., Oct. 23 (CP) — A combination of youth and experience will be available for Los Ramsay when he makes his debut at tomorrow night's workout as playing coach of Moncton Hawks, last year's senior amateur hockey champions of the Maritimes.

Team manager George Schurman tonight announced the arrival in Moncton of six players who will make up the list of imports slated for tryouts with the Hawks.

Heading the list is Ramsay, former Cape Breton Hockey League forward and last year with the Quebec senior group. He will play a forward position and handle the coaching chores.

Accompanying Ramsay from Montreal were two defencemen, Dick Bisset, formerly of Montreal Royals and last year with Baltimore in the United States Amateur League, and Leo Leger, brother of Roger Leger of Montreal Canadiens, and two former junior players in the Montreal League, Paul Gagnon and Roger Jodoin.

From Calgary the Hawks have obtained Fred Spence, 180-pound forward. Also expected to arrive tomorrow are three Prince Edward Island players, Buck Whitlock, Doug Jackson and Boo Morrison, all of Charlotetown. Whitlock played with Hawks last season and Jackson was with the club for several weeks before going to New Glasgow where he finished the season.

Also expected to be out with the team tomorrow night are Hughie MacDonald, three-time Prince Edward Island player, Gene Polinger and Cal Bastarache, and forwards Don Hodge, last year with the Toronto Mercantile League, Joe Joliet, a Montreal junior last year, Mike Demchuk, who played for Agnew and George Bell of last year's Hawks and Bud MacEachern last year with Truro Bearcats.

Decrease Shown In Fishery Returns

Due mainly to a large decrease in the catch of lobsters, coupled with a drop in the price received, the total catch and value of the fish landed by P. E. Island fishermen this year is far below that of a year ago. The figures available are for the first nine months of this year and the same period of last year.

On the basis of comparison for the catch and value of the industry to the province in the two periods mentioned. The total landed catch for all types of fish in the first nine months of this year amounted to 267,226 cwt. for a total value of \$1,373,779. This compares with a total landed catch of 307,557 cwt. for the nine-month period ending September 30, 1946, with a total value of \$2,664,296.

The biggest drop both in the landed total and the value was in lobsters. Fishermen of this province hauled in 58,758 cwt. of this year for a total value of \$1,002,135 as compared to 83,461 cwt. for a total value of \$2,038,333 for the corresponding period a year ago.

The price received represented a sharp drop from the prices current in 1946 and the catch itself was down more than fifty per cent. As lobsters represent by far the major proportion of the fishing industry in the Province any fluctuation in the catch or the market is reflected sharply in the overall picture of the fishing industry in general.

Hake showed a value of nearly \$100,000 less than in 1946. Up to Sept. 30, 1946, 37,831 cwt. had been landed and value was estimated at \$189,278. This year only 39,481 cwt. had been caught, the value dropping to \$89,562.

MacKenzie values were also down in 1947. Although the catch was over 6,000 cwt. greater than the corresponding months of last year, this year's value was only \$75,813 as compared with \$104,369 in 1946. The Irish Moss industry remained fairly stable, with this year's take slightly better than the first nine months of 1946. 46,352 cwt. was taken, realizing \$37,867. Last year's figure was \$56,942.

Smelts also showed a slight decline, 1,000 cwt. less being taken in 1947 than 1946. Value difference amounted to \$3,500. Cod and herring were up slightly in catch and estimated value.
