### AT ROTARY

The monthly meeting of the Rotary Club was held yesterday with the president, Mr. Percy Pope in the chair.

There was one guest, Mr. M. Landry of New York.

It was purely a business meeting. A nominating committee consisting of Walter Grant, Dr. MacMillan and W. M. Rowe was appointed to submit at the next meeting the names of candidates for the positions of president, vice-president, secretary and directors preparatory to the annual elections to be held a month hence.

The president read a communication received from International President Sutton relative to the attitude of the Pope with regard to Rotary.

President Sutton, who is a Catholic himself, said that when in Europe attending a meeting of the European advisory committee, he had visited Rome and taken up the question with the editors of the Catholic journal that had published statements regarding Rotary and Catholicism.

He had published a statement on March 15th, in which he had pointed out (1) that Rotary is a business and professional organization and has no connection with Masonry; (2) that religious and political discussions are forbidden; (3) that there is no record of religious faith of Rotarians; (4) that there are no vows or secrets and that the meetings are conducted openly; (5) that Rotary respects all religious faiths; (6) that it establishes no moral code; (7) that there is nothing in the principles and practices of Rotary contrary to the principles of the Catholic Faith.

### Livestock Report

(Canadian Press)  
MONTREAL, Que., April 1.—Cattle receipts 380. Although there was a very small offering of butcher cattle the demand was not keen and prices remained about steady. Good killing steers averaging around 1075 to 1100 pounds sold for \$9.50 and one car of northwestern cows in fair flesh brought \$7.50, bulls brought from \$5.50 to \$8.50 at time of writing, the best steers had not been sold.  
Calf receipts 282. Trading in the calf market ruled fairly active. One lot of the best calves brought \$12 and common calves were as low as \$8. The bulk of the sales were made between \$10.50 and \$11.50, grass calves were mostly \$8.  
Quotations—Good veal \$12, medium \$10.50 to \$11.50, common \$8 to \$10.80 grass \$8.  
Sheep receipts 61. Two or three early lambs weighing forty pounds or better sold for \$16 each, but lighter lambs brought around \$7.50 each; common yearlings sold for \$10 to \$11 and sheep brought from \$7 to \$8.  
Quotations—Ewes \$7 to \$8; common lambs \$10 to \$11.  
Hog receipts 1617—Hogs were sold on a basis of \$12.75 to \$13 for hogs of good quality. Mixed lots and heavies sold for \$12.50 and \$12.65, and feeders up to \$14. On one market where only a few hogs were offered butchers paid up to \$13.25. Sows were from \$9.50 to \$10.

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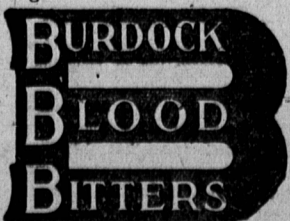
