IN MEMORIAM

MR. JAMES W. ABBOTT

The sympathy of the community is extended to Mr. George Abbott of Union Road in the loss of his brother who died in Nebraska on the 23rd of November. About a year ago he received the sad news of the death of his other brother in Boston. Both men were in the prime of life and achieved the success that men of their type achieve.

The Hershey Times of Hershey, Nebraska, contains the following notice:

The entire community was shocked last evening by the sudden death of James W. Abbott who passed away at his home about 5.30. A heart attack was vital to him and he died with hardly a struggle. Mr. Abbott was feeling the best yesterday and he had for several days, and with nothing with preparations for a Thanksgiving dinner to be given at his house he had made several trips to town, the last one about five o'clock. Upon returning home he went into the house and into the reading room where he asked for the daily paper. He was sitting in his favorite chair when Mrs. Abbott heard an unnatural noise and going to the room where he was found him dying. Dr. Sadler was immediately called and arrived in about three minutes, but was unable to revive him.

James Waldron Abbott was born at Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, Canada, on December 20, 1871. Died November 23, 1927, at the age of 55 years, 11 months and 3 days. His boyhood was spent in Prince Edward Island and at the age of 17 he came to Nebraska where he worked for the Union Pacific Railroad Company. He returned later to Boston where he resided for a year or two and then came back to Nebraska. He was united in marriage to Myrtle Cain on September 23, 1902, who preceded him in death in 1915. To this union was born two children, Charles and Margaret. On September 24, 1917 he was married again to Kathryn Leybold. Besides belonging to several fraternal organizations he had been a member of the Hershey Presbyterian Church for the past 20 years. He had served as an Elder the past year. Those left to mourn the sad parture are a wife and two children, Charles and Margaret, a brother, George, of Prince Edward Island, Canada, a sister, Mrs. Frances MacMillan, of Saskatoon, Canada, and a host of other relatives and friends. Funeral services were held at the Presbyterian Church, Sunday afternoon, November 27, with Rev. E. Knight officiating and the remains were laid to rest in the North Blatte cemetery.

One of the largest funerals ever held in Hershey was witnessed Sunday afternoon when the remains of James W. Abbott was borne to the Presbyterian Church from the home for services, and then to the North Blatte cemetery, the final resting place of all that remains on earth. The attendance signified the esteem in which Mr. Abbott was held in the community.

Many attending the services were compelled to stand on the outside of the church because of lack of room and the procession to the final rest was a mile long. The funeral was over a service of the Masons was held at the grave.

INITIAL GAME AT MONCTON DECEMBER 27; SECOND HERE

ST. JOHN. Dec. 16. — The stage is all set for the opening of the hockey season in the southern and northern sections of New Brunswick. Only one week from next Tuesday night the inaugural game of the season will be played in the southern section, followed two nights later by the northern section. Although the schedule of the middle section has not as yet been officially announced, it is very probable that before the New Year the great winter sport will be in full swing all over New Brunswick.

When Referee Jack Brown blows his whistle in the Moncton Arena on December 27, he will usher in the southern section of the M. A. H. A., or it will probably be called the Maritime Branch of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association.

TEAMS SAME HERE

To the Moncton Atlantics and the Saint John Fusiliers the honor is given of starting the season in their section. This section is composed of the same teams as last season, Moncton, Sussex, Fredericton and Saint John.

All the teams were evenly matched last season and hard fought battles were the rule. The Fusiliers won the first series, and Sussex won the second and also the play-off. The latter team won the Provincial Championship but were defeated by Kentville in the final. Advice indicate that the various teams in this section will be of equal or greater strength than last season. Some of the old timers may be missing from the line-up but their places are being taken by younger players, some of whom have yet to win their spurs.

MORE SPEED EXPECTED

The changing of the rules to conform with those in use by other amateur leagues throughout Canada will be of interest to the followers of the game. General opinion is that the changes introduced have had a tendency to speeding up the game and reducing the number of stops for off-sides, etc. Fusiliers, present indications are that practically all of last year's team, with the exception of Phil Halliway, will be in evidence and also some new and promising material. The team has not yet been chosen.

Sunday Sermonette

"For ye know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that He was rich yet for your sakes He became poor, that ye through His poverty might be rich." 2 Corinthians 8:9.

Isn't that a beautiful text? First of all it is so beautiful because of the "For ye know." When you speak to people about something they know you interest them at once. Suppose you meet someone who was born in the same place with you and talk over the old haunts, how interested both of you are. You are talking about what you both know. And in the midst of our busy Christmas preparations it is not the same with the old, old story, "You know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ." It is the warp and woof of our religious experience. It is the sweet Gospel story, the music which calls us away because it is the melody of our souls. It is the joy of our hearts. If you have got a dear human sympathetic heart it is the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ in you.

The "He was rich." There is no doubt about that. He was rich, very God of very God, Lord of all. "Yet He became poor" and the whole history of the Master is one of poverty—He was born in a stable. The people said, "Is not this the Carpenter's son?" When He went on His ministry "He had not where to lay His head." Then they scourged Him, maligned Him, stripped Him quite naked of everything. And then they laid Him in a charity grave. Our dear Master in every truth was poor. "Let this mind be in you which was also in Christ Jesus; who being in the form of God thought it not robbery to equal with God; but made Himself of no reputation and took upon Him the form of a servant and was made in the likeness of man; and being found in fashion as a man, He humbled Himself and became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross."

"Who for our sakes." Don't forget "for our sakes." If you want a sweet little motto to stir you to a good Christian act, here it is—three words, "For Christ's Sake." Write this in your heart and do all the good you do "For Christ's Sake," and abstain from doing that which is wrong "For Christ's Sake."
