BABY BOY

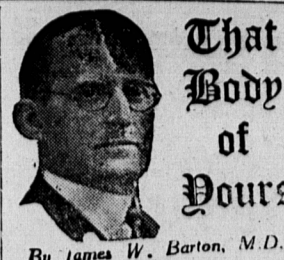
Dear Baby Boy, you little know The hopes which centre round you Nor all the castles love has built Since that first day we found you.
