IN MEMORIAM

PHILIP LORD, NORTH TRYON

In the death of Mr. Philip Lord who passed away on Saturday, Feb. 6th, the neighborhood has lost another very highly respected resident. For fifteen years the general store in North Tryon was conducted by him. He was thus brought into intimate relationship with the whole neighborhood and realized what an honorable and respected citizen has been taken from them. He had reached the fairly ripe age of 74. He leaves a widow, three brothers, three sons and a daughter. He was a member of the Tryon Baptist Church for the long period of 54 years and held the office of Deacon for about 48 years. His remains were laid to rest in the Tryon Cemetery on Monday, 8th. There was a large gathering of mourners and sympathizers at the house. The funeral service was conducted by the Rev. G. M. Young and the Rev. Arthur Hurn. Mr. Hurn took charge of the basis of his address Acts 20:19, "Serving the Lord with all humility of mind" said that was the scripture which he would like to use concerning the departed. He was called into service and served in humility and with a patriotism to his Lord and to Truth.

ADMIRAL STURDEE IS A CANADIAN.

OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 15.—That Vice-Admiral Sturdee, whose squadron sank the German cruisers of the Falkland Islands, is a Canadian, a native of St. John, N.B., is confirmed by Senator De Vobor of Lethbridge, Senator who is a St. John man himself, says that he was a schoolmate of Sturdee. The Senator states that in 1889 four young residents of St. John left to join the Imperial Navy, and among these lads was a "Fred" Sturdee. Another was Fred Pike, son of Captain Pike, R.N., and a cousin of the Senator's, who was later an admiral and who has since retired.

Still another was "Charlie" Drury, now Admiral Sir Charles Carter Drury, retired, second sea lord 1903 to 1908, A.D.C. to the Queen, 1897 to 1899, G.C.B., G.C.V.C., K.C.B., etc. The fourth was "Ernie" Simmonds, now Rear-Admiral in charge of the Malta dockyard.

The Sturdees, Drurys, Simmonds and Pikes all belonged to the same set in St. John, said Senator De Vobor, "and I can well remember them all. Sturdee was a little fellow when I left St. John to attend school at Windsor. He was small and stocky, and a fighter always. As near as I can remember these boys all left about the same time to join the navy, and they have all made for themselves positions of trust and honour."
